I one car taking 5 minutes to unoad passengers, as very few had the correct fare. That five minutes may nean a late mark against employees who work at places where they have check in on a time clock when they nter their place of business.

The high prices realized here were unexpected, although some of the outsiders may have known they were coming before the local shippers proving every day, the railway doing everything it can to relieve the congestion. "The embargo on American shipments is easing up loading, and if the present fine, mild weather coninues for a few days, we will be pretwell out of the woods," said Mr.

In answer to a question, why is there

uch a demand for Prince Edward Island potatoes this year, when last rear you could hardly give them away, Mr. Mutch said that the situation resembles that of 1919. Early in the fall the market opened at 40c. and it was not until later nearing the lose of navigation that the Americans realized their shortage, and the rice increased rapidly, there being as high as \$3.50 a bushel paid. This year the Americans jumped in much arlier in the season in a scramble get all the potatoes they could. I am not given to predictions said r. Mutch, but I will make a predicon that potatoes will be selling nore cheaply in Prince Edward Isand before the middle of next May than they are selling to-day. With North America conserving potaoes the big shortage may be made up. There is no doubt a shortage exists. Two years ago European potatoes were kept out of the Cuban market and that tended to reduce the supply in hte United States owing to the heavy shipments from that country into Cuba. The embargo still exists, but t is being reported that it may be ifted shortly. If so it is claimed that uropean potatoes can be obtained in uha more cheaply than elsewhere. harlottetown Guardian, Nov. 13.
