Serious Accident.

We regret to state that a very serious and probably fatal accident occurred to Col. T. Saunders, Clerk of the Peace, between ten and eleven o'clock on this (Monday) morning. The Colonel, accompanied by his serving man, was driving in his covered buggy down Paisley street towards the town, and when near the corner of Dublin street he was overtaken by a runaway team, which leaped at and partially over Mr. Saunders' vehicle, wrecking it badly and throwing out the occupants.

The man escaped unhurt, but Col. Saunders received severe injuries on the side of that head. He was carried into the house of Mr. John Ewing, close by, and Drs. Herod, Keating, and Worsfold were quickly in attendance, when it was found the half of the scalp was torn off, and the skull was extensively fractured. A deep wound had also been inflicted at the back of the ear, and a portion of the ear taken off. The runaway team belonged to a German, who was delivering vegetables near the West Ward school. The horses were frightened by the sudden onset of the boys of the West Ward school at recess time, and started off with the disastrous results related.

Four Feet Eight and a Half.

The change of gauge is now an accomplished fact on the Grand Trunk. On Saturday afternoon a gang of men were busy narrowing the sidings at the Guelph passenger station. Over the bridge the change was effected by moving the longitudinal beam or "sleeper" upon which the rail rests, so that the fastenings of the rail were not disturbed. In the work all along the main line, much time was saved by the previous insertion of spikes in the ties in the places where the inside edge of the rail was to come, so when moved the rail had only to be pressed against these and the outside spikes driven home. The first train over the new gauge was a special car from Stratford sent to pick up the men and test the road, which passed Guelph between five and six on Saturday evening. The first up train was a similar special, which passed here between 10 and 11 on Sunday morning. This morning (Monday) the trains commenced to run as usual, commencing with the Berlin mixed train due out from here at 7:30 a.m. The new engines are good and powerful ones. Some of the old locomotives have been converted to the new gauge, and others have been broken up or sold.

Four of the Mudee prisoners have been hanged at Fort Klamath. The other two, Barneho and Siohok, were reprieved.

Mrs. Wm. Turner, of Holland Landing, was fatally burned on Friday by falling in a fit whilst carrying a coal oil lamp.

A girl of seventeen, named Lavina Sheehy, of Mariposa Township, was drugged and criminally abused by several scoundrels from Port Perry. Eleven persons have been arrested, and the identity of three of them. She was dreadfully treated, and has had hysterical fits ever since.

The sixteenth annual exhibition of the South Simcoe Agricultural Society, held last week at Cookstown, was by far the best ever held in the county. The total entries were over 2,500, and there were not less than 4,500 people on the grounds.

A VERY successful teachers' institute was conducted in the Berlin Town Hall on Friday and Saturday by Dr. Sangster. Over 180 teachers and many trustees and other friends of education were present.

At a recent meeting of the London, Huron & Bruce Railway, four of the nine Directors resigned their positions on the Board, viz: Mayor Walker, President, E. W. Hyman, Treasurer; Messrs. E. Harris, and R. Reid. The rupture is said to have occurred on the question of the awarding of the contracts.

The day upon which the formal opening of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway will take place has been definitely fixed for Wednesday the 8th inst.

JOHN TAYLOR, found guilty at the assizes recently held at Barns, of having murdered, with the assistance of his son George, a man named Fisher, at Parry Sound, last winter, has made a confession, in which he admits his guilt, but denies that he is ever participated in it, or was even cognizant of the crime.

A BOY named Peter Lyall, thirteen years old, while standing on one of the side tracks at the Harrison station, yard, was knocked down by an engine on Saturday, which passed over him, completely cutting him in two.

MR. GOLDWIN SMITH has commenced a series of lectures in Montreal on English Revolutionary history.

Thirty feet of the tunnel on 4th Avenue New York caved in on Saturday, stopping travel several hours on the Harlem and Hudson Railway. No one injured.

The last stone of the International Bridge, near Fort Erie, was laid on Friday afternoon. The bridge will be ready for trains on the 27th inst.

Penian Amnesty Again.

Firing at Ashbury's Yacht.

London, Oct. 6. - At a meeting held yesterday at Dundalk, in favor of an amnesty to the Fenian convicts, 10,000 people were present.

Santander, Oct. 5. - The yacht Eothen, with her owner, Mr. Ashbury, on board, has arrived here. Ashbury reports while in the port of Bilbao the Carlists fired on his vessel, which narrowly escaped destruction.

London, Oct. 5. - The Observer's Paris special states that 350 Deputies of the Assembly have pledged themselves to the restoration of Monarchy.

Madrid, Oct. 5. - General Mariones last week offered battle to the Carlists before Estella. The Carlists refused to fight, and on Saturday precipitately evacuated Estella, which was occupied by the Government forces.

More Condemnation.

The Pall Mall Gazette, an influential English journal, has an important article on the Pacific Scandal. After reviewing the evidence which has been given before the Royal Commission, the Pall Mall Gazette says: -

"Here were all the conditions of a bargain between a capitalist intriguing for his contract and a Minister intriguing for his majority; and though we do not dispute the fact of the dishonesty of Sir John Macdonald and Mr. Langverin, that the bargain was not put into words, it is impossible to view the circumstances without grave distrust. It is bad enough when a Minister uses money to buy elections; but to say that conduct such as Sir John A. Macdonald's was deserving of reprobation is to say little. That it is the duty of the people of Canada to reject Sir John Macdonald from office if they desire to save their country from sinking to the lowest level of American politics may be true enough, and it will be to the benefit of the honest people of the Dominion to take care that none of the persons who were concerned in the proceedings of which Sir George Cartier was the agent, shall ever again obtain power in Canada." "The Minister who takes money for the purposes of party corruption is not to be trusted with the affairs of a self-respecting community, or to continue even formally a member of the Sovereign's Privy Council."

The article concludes by saying that the offence of which Sir John A. Macdonald stands convicted by his own admission is a political crime for which there is a fitting punishment.

Local and Other Items

The people of Neustadt and vicinity are subscribing to assist Mr. Heuther in the re-erection of his burned brewery.

The track-laying on the Mount Forest, and Harrison extension of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Railway is now fully underway.

Harper's Magazine reached us as usual this month from our friends Messrs. Tunis & Co., wholesale newsdealers, Clifton.

BEARS AND WOLVES are plentiful in South Luthar at present. Some five or six have recently been killed. Over thirty sheep have been destroyed during the past month or six weeks in the neighborhood of Arthur Village by wolves.

ON SUNDAY morning, Mr. Wm. Lipton, of the ninth concession of Minto, drove over to Mount Forest. He was taken suddenly ill with inflammation of the bowels, and died about 12 o'clock on Monday night.

MR. THOMAS WHITE, JR., made oath on the Commission that he had heard that \$25,000 had been raised by the Banque du Peuple for Mr. Jettie's election expenses. The Banque has very promptly and emphatically denied the truth of the rumor.

The annual exhibition of the Agricultural Society of Mono, was held in Orangeville last week. The attendance was not large, and in all other respects the show was inferior to former exhibitions. The horses, stock, implements, and articles shown, however, were very good.

THEFT - Mr. Burnett, farmer in Minto, was robbed of some \$925 on Wednesday by an unknown individual prowling around Clifford. He tried to make his escape, but was caught in Harrison, and taken back to Clifford, where he confessed the theft, delivered over the money, and was let go.

A DISTRESSING accident occurred on Friday at the Ingersoll station of the G. W. R. Two daughters of Mr. Alex. Mutterer, of North Oxford, were in a carriage, and while waiting at the freight-house a train frightened the horses, and caused them to back up against the train. The concussion threw both of the girls out, and the train passed over one of them. Miss Annie Mutterer, about 10 years old, completely cut her in two. The oldest girl was also thrown under the train, but by the presence of mind of a man standing by was rescued from instant death. The greater part of one of her hands was, however, cut off.

MASTERS' COURTS - On Monday 22 ult., Thos. McCarthy of Minto, appeared before Messrs. Thos. Swan and Sidney Smith, Justices of the Peace, on a charge of assaulting Joseph Page, also of Minto. McCarthy was fined \$2, and costs \$4.10.

On the same day Joseph Page was arraigned before Mr. Swan, charged with using abusive language towards Ann Elizabeth McCarthy. Defendant was required to pay a fine of \$
