

to the appointment of such an Inspector. Mr. Ross read the resolution passed at the last session of Council, postponing the matter until the present sitting; also the section of the statute providing for the appointment of the Inspector. He would like an expression of opinion from the Council as to whether such an Inspector should be appointed or not.

Mr. McMillan thought such an officer would be of no use whatever. The township inspectors would answer every purpose. At the same time, if the Council could not get out of it, they had better make the appointment.

Mr. Ross thought that the County Inspector was intended to be a sort of intermediate officer between the Provincial Inspector and the Township Inspectors, and that the latter would report to him.

Mr. Tolton's letter was received, and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Leslie brought up the report of the County Roads Committee. They recommended the management of the county roads by Commissioners as heretofore; that the balance of last year's appropriation, \$50 per mile, be granted for the repair of the county roads for the current year; and that the following councillors be commissioners on the following roads:

GUELPH AND FERRIS ROAD.—Messrs. Darcy, Broadfoot, and son and Hood. GUELPH AND LAMBTON.—Messrs. Laird, Law, Rea and Duffield. EAST COUNTY ROAD.—Messrs. McMillan, Tester and Handerson. FERRIS AND DOUGLAS.—Messrs. Gibson, Hamilton and Mitchell. FERRIS AND ARTHUR.—Messrs. Mair, McManis and Hanson.

ARTHUR AND MOUNT FERRIS.—Messrs. Sheverson, P. Hollinger, O'Donnell and Kilkenny. JUNCTION TO BOSWORTH.—Messrs. Darcy, McGowan, Roberts and McKim. BOSWORTH TO TEVIOTDALE.—Messrs. Ogd and Robb.

TEVIOTDALE TO COUNTY LINE AT CLIFFORD.—Messrs. Frain, Melkiewicz and Miller. GUELPH AND DUNDAS.—Messrs. Leslie, Howard and Nicoll. CANAL ROAD.—Messrs. Swan and McKim.

The Committee also recommended that the petition of W. D. Leslie be referred to the commissioners of the road therein referred to, to report to the Council at next session. Also that the County Solicitor be instructed to proceed against John Ridd. The vouchers of Guelph and Ferris road expenditure, \$86, had been examined and found correct. It was recommended that the Warden, Messrs. Mair and Ogd be a committee to examine, authorize and superintend the erection and repairing of all boundary line bridges in the county, and that they consider the report of a repairs and erection of boundary line bridges laid over from last Council. Also that the bridge over the Conestoga river be referred to the commissioners of the road from Bosworth to Junction.

The report was adopted. The Warden read a copy of a resolution in reference to the Canada Thistle Act, passed by the Elgin County Council, and forwarded by them with a request that it should be submitted to this Council. It was to the effect that the Legislature be petitioned to amend the Canada Thistle Act, so that Township Councils may have power to make by-laws to authorize overseers of highways to enter fields of grain or other crops to destroy Canada thistles.

The communication was ordered to be laid on the table. A number of accounts were read by the Warden and referred to the Finance Committee. The Council adjourned.

Ontario Legislative Assembly, Feb. 5. At the opening of the House Mr. O'Donohoe, the newly elected member for Ottawa, took his seat.

On a motion for a return of all persons appointed to situations by the Ontario Government since Jan. 1, 1878, the formal motion of Mr. Rykert was finally put and carried.

Mr. Bellairs' Bill respecting the law of landlord and tenant passed through Committee of the Whole.

Mr. Clarke, (Wellington), in moving the second reading of the Bill to require owners of threshing and other machines to guard against accident, remarked that, with the increase of machinery accidents had also increased until threshing machine accidents had become almost as frequent as railway accidents. He found that there had been no legislation in England similar to that which he proposed, but in the States of Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa and Minnesota, similar measures had been in force for some years, and had been most successful in reducing the number of accidents. He proposed to compel the covering of the joints of the machines under a penalty not less than \$2 or more than \$20. He also proposed that half the penalty should go to the informer and half to the school section in which the accident took place. He desired, if the Bill were read a second time, to have it referred to a committee, with a view to embody in it certain practical suggestions which he had received from gentlemen on both sides of the House.

Hon. Mr. Mowat said the object of the Bill was most important one. The desirability of some such legislation had long been felt, though there was some difficulty as to the form it should take. It was certain that there was no legislation on the subject in England, or in the older States of the American Union. In several States, however, it had been found to work beneficially. They were indebted to his hon. friend for the great amount of trouble he had taken on the subject, and he was glad to concur in the motion for the second reading.

The Bill was then read a second time and referred to a committee composed of Hon. Mr. Mowat, Messrs. Patterson, Topley, Giles, Farewell, Paxton, Smith and Clarke, (Wellington).

Dr. Baxter moved the second reading of his measure amending the Act relating to the practice of medicine and surgery.
