THE WAR AGAINST
THE CIGARETTE

The Mayor Has Instructed
Enforcement of Anti-
Cigarette Laws

Y.M.C.A. OBJECTS TO
BEER ADVERTISEMENT

Members Object to Having
it Placed on Back of
Car Tickets

Pursuant to a request of the Young Men's Christian association, Mayor Jamieson has instructed Chief of Police Mackie to strictly enforce the law prohibiting the sale of cigarettes to minors and the use of them by such persons.

The members of the Round Table are making a sort of anti-cigarette campaign. They are freely distributing Hubbs' well-known pamphlet, entitled, "The Cigarette," in which he says: "As a whole, the nation is an employer of labor for over twenty-five years. I give you this: Never advance the price of a cigarette unless you are prepared to carry a roll of Garcia and are willing to lose the roll."

At the meeting of the Round Table held yesterday afternoon, it was discussed the liquor question, with Mr. A. Price, general superintendent of the C. P. R., as leader. E. E. Yates of the Dominion Land office read a letter setting forth the deleterious effects of alcohol on the body.

During the talk it was proposed that there would be no bars in Calgary. Reference was made to the Alexandria hotel, Lethbridge, conducted on the European plan, and without a bar, as an example of the fact that the best hotels nowadays are being conducted without selling liquor as a sideline.

The Beer Advertisement
Someone pointed out that Supl. McCalley of the street railway system has placed beer advertisements on the sides of street car tickets, and on some of Mr. Price's resolutions was directed taking the committee to refrain from such a practice in the future.

At a meeting of the Round Table club at the Y. M. C. A. on Sunday, May 23, under the leadership of Mr. Price, the question of cigarette smoking was under discussion.

The club recognizes that, so far as men are concerned, perfect liberty is theirs to smoke or not, but in view of the deleterious effects on the body of the community and with the knowledge that the present law specifically covers the sale and use of cigarettes by the proper authorities are notified to fully carry out the provisions of that law in Calgary.

The United States Dividing
UP GEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT
Are Copying Some of the Regulations
in the Dominion of Canada.

Ottawa, May 28.—Hon. Wm. Tomlinson, minister of mines, and R. W. Brock, director of the geological service, have been visiting some of the regulations in the United States, including Washington. The United States government has recently decided to establish a geological survey, thus following the example of Canada in this regard.

The shield will be held by the cadet corps of the winning city, town or county, which upon inspection by the district officer commanding, or other selected military officer, shall show the greatest proficiency in military drill and rifle shooting.

Mitchell is Certain Macleod
May Not Accept
Invitation

MAY NOT BE FOURTH
MINISTER JUST NOW

Marshall, McDougall and
Stocks Mentioned as
Possibilities

Edmonton, May 28.—It is more than likely that Premier Sifton will not make any announcement about his cabinet and the policy of the government today, but may delay it for a few days longer.

It is certain that Judge Mitchell will preside at the department of the attorney-general.

It is also certain that Mr. A. McLean of Lethbridge district, whose home is in Taber, will hold one cabinet position. It all depends upon himself, but he is rather disinclined to take the position as his business interests are very large, some of which would be sacrificed.

The fourth position there is much speculation. It is quite probable that there will be three ministers for the present. It seems that Mr. Cross will not be a member of the cabinet for the present, and very unlikely that he will join the government in the very near future.

Duncan Marshall is somewhat more likely. It was not during his term of office that the objectionable contract was made. His objection with the A. & G. W. was not very close and was little more than staying with the government and defending it for the bad bargain that it had made. If he remains he will doubtless be installed again in the office of the minister of agriculture.

John McDougall is mentioned, but his selection would cause some trouble and might lead to a fierce conflict. The feeling in Edmonton is very high, and it is thought that his selection now would meet with some opposition.

John Stocks has been mentioned and in case he is selected he will be made minister of public works.

The news that the incident is considered the more the Cross demonstration of Thursday last is believed to have been a mistake. It was originally intended to burn Frank Oliver. John McDougall and J. R. Boyle in effect, however, counsel prevailed and the burning of the program was not carried out.

THE ITALIAN GOVERNMENT
ASSISTS ITALIAN SHIPPING
Provides a Subsidy of \$6,000,000 to Help

RECORD FLIGHT BY
AMERICAN AVIATOR
Curtis Does the Distance from Albany
to New York, 137 Miles, in
2 Hours, 32 Minutes.

New York, May 28.—Glenn H. Curtiss flew from Albany to New York today, winning the \$10,000 prize offered by the New York World. He covered the distance of 137 miles in two hours, 32 minutes, his average speed being 54.86 miles per hour. The speed was the fastest ever made in a long distance flight. The start was made from Albany at 7:03 o'clock. This morning and Poughkeepsie, the first stopping place, was made at 8:23. His flight was resumed at 9:25, and he landed on Manhattan Island at 11:00.
