Lillian Russell's Beauty Secrets

MAUDE M.: In order to develop the chest you should take the deep breathing exercise. When dressing in the morning and undressing at night draw in the breath slowly and fully and then let it out as slowly. At the same time try to meet your elbows at the back. You hold your arms horizontally to the chest with the elbows bent, the hands doubled into fists, and then separate the fists, bringing the arms backward. You cannot begin to meet the elbows at the back, but you must try to do so. This exercise develops the chest muscles much and will also increase the apparent size of the bust. The latter can be increased in size by rubbing gently with cold cream. All massaging and handling of the bust should be done with care. MISS M. M.: There is nothing better for removing superfluous hair than the electric needle. However, if the growth is light you can easily remove it yourself if you will but take the time and patience. Apply twice daily one-third ammonia and two-thirds peroxide of hydrogen. The peroxide will bleach the hair so that it will become less noticeable and the ammonia will gradually kill the roots. Do not expect results too quickly, for the treatment takes time, but it is a sure result if persisted in.

F. M.: There must be some cause for your hair falling so rapidly. I would advise you to massage your scalp with the tips of your fingers about ten minutes each night before retiring. Perhaps the scalp has become tightened and adhered to the underlying bones. Often this is the cause of hair falling. The scalp should be flexible so that it can be moved easily. If it is not kept this way by daily massage the hair will lose its lustre and become dull and lifeless and fall. I cannot print the formula for the hair tonic on account of lack of space, but I will be glad to send it to you if you will send me a stamped addressed envelope. This is an excellent tonic and gives complete instructions for scalp massage.

MRS. M. C.: I cannot give you the formula for a face powder. It isn't worth while to make powder, for usually it isn't any better and sometimes not as good as the proprietary article. A good grade of rice powder is about the best for the face. Remember when buying a face powder always get a good brand. Cheap powders are not worth the trouble and will ruin a good complexion.

MRS. E. W.: You should try with means in your power to give your laughter a good carriage. 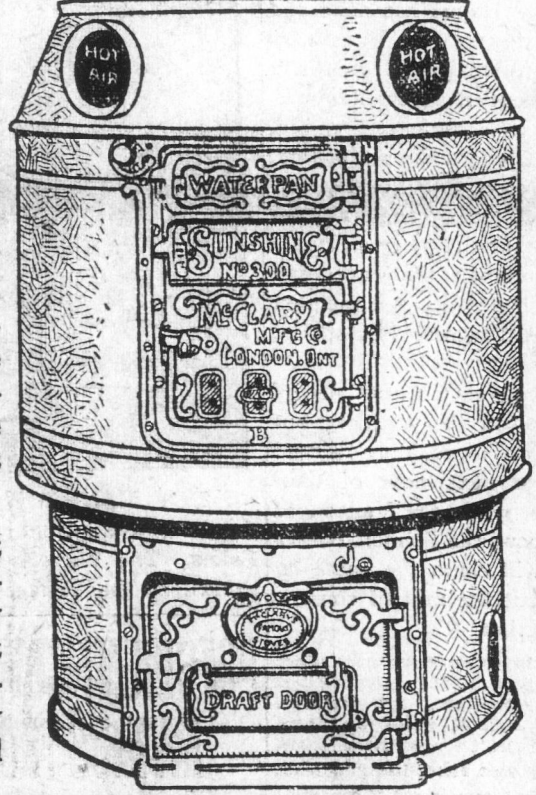

LEPER RUNS WILD IN CITY OF BUFFALO EXPOSING MANY TO DREAD DISEASE

Buffalo, July 25.—Sam Isen, a Russian immigrant, believed to be severely afflicted with virulent leprosy, who had been sought through several states for weeks, was found in Buffalo last night and placed in isolation in the Ernest Wende Hospital on Broadway under police guard.

Isen, who has been in America three years, how long he has had the disease no one knows, but he has been a leprosy suspect since last spring. The first to suspect him was Dr. Goodwin, of Bay City, Mich., where Isen has a wife and three children. Other physicians at Ann Arbor and in New York have had him under observation and pronounced his case leprosy. They have also made some sort of bluff at isolating him, but he somehow has managed to escape.

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even when the Bay City authorities had him isolated in a house with the windows boarded up and officers on guard. He escaped from that semi-prison about two weeks ago and determined to flee to Russia. He started for New York, but stopped off in Buffalo last Tuesday because his money had given out. He says he has been carrying here away money which he expected him wife to send him, with which to go to New York and sail for his native land.

Not a Welcome Prisoner
 From the case with which he seems to have escaped from the health authorities of other cities, there is a suspicion that he is a most unwelcome prisoner of whom any city that had him was glad to be rid. The Buffalo health authorities are not enthusiastic about their capture, and frankly admit they will try to have him shipped back to Bay City or deported from the country.
