

A THOROUGH CANADIAN.
Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, in his recent speech at the Club National banquet, gave utterance to truly patriotic and Canadian sentiments. He said that "the Liberals of each Province rejoiced at the success of each other. Some of Mr. Mowat's opponents had made a great fuss about the French-Canadians, alleging they had no common interest with their English-speaking compatriots. That was not correct, for though they might speak another language and belong to another church they were at once with their English brethren in their desire to advance the common and material interests of the country. They had no desire to make up a French nation on the shores of the St. Lawrence as some people said, but they did desire to see their country go ahead. We could not always remain a colony. The time must come when we would have to take our proper position in the world and for one so awaited independence. We are all Canadians, and should work together. Any friction there was in the working of the Confederation was due to the centralizing tendencies of the Federal Government. The Liberal leader correctly reflects the feelings of the large majority of the people of the Dominion, no matter what their origin."

Victims of the Heat.
MONTREAL, July 2.—The hot weather has had a terrible effect upon the young children of Montreal. No less than 55 children of Roman Catholic parents succumbed to cholera infantum last week, and 37, nearly all children, to diarrhea. There were in all 183 burials in Cote de Negre Cemetery last week, an increase of 61 over the previous week and 89 over the same week last year. The Protestant returns have not yet been issued.

Dr. Peters' Movements.

CYCLONE IN HASTINGS.

Several Persons Struck by Lightning.

Baras Burned, Crops Destroyed and Fruit Trees Stripped.

BELLEVILLE, July 2.—A most destructive cyclone, accompanied by rain and thunder, visited this section last night. The damage done was within a radius of 25 miles. It is anticipated that the fruit crop as a result will be an entire failure this season. Trees were torn up by their roots and whirled through the air some distance, and buildings were laid low in every direction. WORK AND WAGES.

Insipient Labor Riot in New York—Proposed International Congress of Workmen.

NEW YORK, July 3.—A mob of 200 striking cloakmakers assembled in front of the firms of Meyers and Janssen, No. 354 Broadway, and set upon the operatives who are working in those places shortly before 8 o'clock this morning. For half an hour there was an insipient riot on the busy thoroughfare, but the mob were dispersed by the police. Several persons were slightly hurt, but none seriously. No arrests were made.

The row was lively while it lasted and created much excitement. The police used their clubs freely.

THE CHICAGO STRIKE.
CHICAGO, July 3.—The strike of stevedores is weakening. Many of the strikers have applied for their old places at the old terms. At a meeting of the propeller line agents it was decided that the demands of the striking freight handlers be not acceded to. There is now about \$5,000,000 worth of floating property—about twenty steamships—tied up here as a result of the strike.

SHORTAGE ROUTES FOR POSTOFFICE EMPLOYEES.
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 3.—The Committee on Postoffices and Post Roads of the United States House of Representatives have reported favorably the bill limiting the hours of labor to eight hours for clerks in first and second-rate postoffices.

THE ST. LOUIS CARPENTERS.
ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 3.—The carpenters have agreed to return to work for those houses who were willing to give ten hours' pay for nine hours' work after July 15. Of the 1,500 men who are now unemployed about 1,000 will be able to obtain work.

THE RAILWAYS.

Grand Trunk Earnings—Extension of the St. C. and N. G. R.—The Gatineau Branch.

It is reported that the Canadian Pacific Railway will shortly acquire the Gatineau Valley Railway; now being built north from Hull.

The Grand Trunk Railway earnings for the week ending June 28, 1890, were \$373,064; for same period in 1889, \$396,302, a decrease in 1890 of \$23,238.

The directors of the St. Catharines and Niagara Central Railway say the extension of the road into Toronto has been arranged. The capital stock of the company has been increased from \$300,000 to \$1,000,000.

THE LOTTERY MEN GET THERE.
NEW ORLEANS, July 3.—The Senate amendments to the Louisiana Lottery Bill were concurred in by the House, yesterday by a vote of 68 to 25. There is much satisfaction over the final outcome of the fight.

Disaster at the Fair in Ohio.
PHILADELPHIA, July 3.—A fire from Sapeville, Ohio, says that the loss to bridges and roads in that county from the storm with rain and hail, yesterday, was \$294,000. Several short lines connecting Ohio railways have been totally abandoned on account of washouts.

Painful Death at Battle Creek.
BATTLE CREEK, Mich., July 3.—A death happened here Monday, the cause of which was entirely unique in the experience of the physician. About three days ago blood began to ooze from the chest and throat of Freddie Humphrey. The bleeding increased until the day of his death, when the blood flowed through his skin on all parts of his body, the skin frequently bursting, causing the boy the most intense pain. Just before death the body turned wholly black. The doctors here have failed to explain the case.

Suicide of a Bank Officer.
PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 3.—Nicholas Gratton Von Bonnhorst, secretary and treasurer of the People's Savings Bank, shot himself this morning at his home in Ingram Station. The cause of suicide is not known, but he is believed to have been far from the best of health. He intended making a general change of offices. His accounts are straight. He was 35 years old, single and a member of one of the oldest and most prominent families in this section.
