The city needs better sewerage to improve its sanitary condition and make it the cleanest and healthiest city in the Dominion.

The city is compelled to improve its sewerage by the civil courts, which have pronounced judgment, and forbid us emptying sewage into the river.

The plan proposed is the work of three of the best sanitary engineers in Canada and the United States, and has the approval of the Provincial Board of Health.

Should the future requirements of the city demand other means of sewage disposal, the proposed system will simply have to be extended further, and the proposed works utilized as far as they go. Not a dolar of the present expenditure will be wasted.

Under the act, which provides the most just and equitable methods of meeting the cost, the annual rate of taxation will only be acreased half a mill on the dollar. The man who pays \$10 taxes will only have to pay 25 cents more.

Let every ratepayer who desires to improve the city, and who wishes to save it from serious annoyance, as well as law costs and fines that will eventually amount to more than the expense of sewer construction, vote for the bylaw of Wednesday, the 2nd September, and then take a neighbor to the polls and see that he votes.

Rebels Tried to Bring About a Revolu tion in the Philippine Islands.

Madrid, Aug. 31.-Official telegrams received here from Capt.-Gen. Blanco, Governor of the Philippine Islands, announce that 1,000 rebels took the field cars, and are holding indignation against the Spanish forces for the purpose of bringing about a revolution. The insurgents were badly arm-ed and easily defeated. The troops are now in pursuit of the fugitives. Gov. Blanco, however, estimates, that the Separatists number at least 4,000. He has asked the Government to send reinforcements. The Spanish Ministry today decided to send 2,000 troops to the Philippine Islands without delay.

SLAUGHTERED LIKE DOGS

Brutal Work in Constantinople Europeans Take Refuge in Their Cellars.

Berlin, Aug. 31.-The Tageblatt's Constantinople correspondent, describing the riots at Constantinople, says that he saw bands of Turks, 30 or 40 in number, armed with clubs and cudgels, crouching in the various street carners, planning to kill any single Armenian on sight. He adds that their methods were full of cruelty, such as one could scarcely apply to the killing of a mad dog. He saw an Armenian priest hacked into a shapeless mass with cudgels in the hands of Turks, whom he denominates "sav-ages." He claims to have witnessed twenty instances of a similar character, and never in a single instance did the troops or the police disturb the assassins. Later he met six manure wagons which were being driven from

At Galata 41 other Armenians were dragged off to a terrible death, while an English merchant who ventured to protest was thrown into the water. Numerous other brutal and

revolting murders are reported. Paris, Aug. 31.-The Temps publishes a dispatch from Constantinople, filed on Friday evening, saying, "At the London, Aug. 31.—Some of the under-clothing worn by Whitehead, the Irishon unarmed Armenians. The victims of the outbreak exceed 2,000."

Another dispatch says it is as yet impossible to tell the number of victims of the rioting. Fifty bodies were counted in the street between Dolme bagtebe and Tophanes, which looked like a battlefield.

Scores of dead have been thrown into the sea in order to save the peo-ple the trouble of burying the bodies. The British charge d'affaires has refused the request of the Sultan to withdraw the guards of British marines, saying he cannot do so until the disorders are thoroughly quelled. Of the Armenians who were seized in the Ottoman Bank, five were killed and five were wounded in the bank. They all came from abroad. The fifteen survivors have been sent to Marseilles.
