# FIFTY YEARS AGO

Rev. Dr. Proudfoot Talks of His First Pastoral Charge-Interesting Reminiscences.

Interesting services marked the 50th

anniversary of the First Presbyterian

Church at St. Marys last week. Rev. T. A. Cosgrove, the pastor, presided over the jubilee, and in briefly reviewing the history of the church, said that in the past 50 years there had been six pastors: Dr. Proudfoot, for three years; Dr. Caven, for fourteen years; the late Dr. Waters for five years; Rev. John McAlpine, who was prevented by sci-atica from being present at the jubilee; Rev. Mr. Turnbull, and the speaker. Rev. Dr. Proudfoot, of London, on being introduced, at once called up recollections of the early days of his pastorate. It was next to impossible, he said, in those days to get accommodation. For three months at least he came out from London every Saturday afternoon, going to Downie Sunday morning and St. Marys, afternoon, leaving for London next morning. As there were no liveries in London, this had to be done on horseback. The exposure and fatigue at the end of three months brought on a fever. The roads in those days were almost impassable. For several reasons he did not venture to purchase either a cutter or a buggy. Reaching the village of St. Marys one Saturday night and stopping with the leading miller, a 'Methodist, he started out again in the morning on horseback and as the next night drew on he sought lodgings at a farm ouse, and learned he had traveled but six miles that whole day, while he had to tear up his bandanna handkerchief to bind the wounds on his horse's legs. 'At that time the Proof Line road was built satisfactorily, but it was next to impossible to get from St. Marys to it.

The speaker continued to describe the condition of the country, and the settlers, as he knew them half a century ago, and dwelt upon the distress of poverty in those early days. In closing, he said he knew the people of the congregation in their poverty and difficulties, and he felt for them, and he was a very happy man to be with them once
