Halifax, N.S., Aug. 8 .- The schooner Cambridge, which sailed from this port June 6th, to explore the coast of Labrador, has returned from an unsuccessful trip. Capt. Clay told a reporter that from the Straits of Belle Isle, as far north as Hamilton Inlet, there is ror gave three in the eighth and tied | no gold, nothing but a granite streak and very little timber. here on the schooner A. Hardy, was equally successful. When Capt. Clay reached Lewis Inlet of starvation. They had no flour for five weeks, and many were so weak for lack of food they could not leave their crude beds. Even the dogs were so emaciated that they could hardly crawl around. The people are suffering tremendously on account of the excessive duties levied by the Newfoundland Government on food stuffs. Dr. Morris did good work in alleviating the suffering of the people, attending to the sick night and day. The Labrador fishery is this year a complete failure.
