

CITY'S PROPOSAL

Terms Upon Which the County Can Become Joint Owners in the Hospital.

Feeling Among the City Committee That the County Will Decline to Take Any Share in the Institution.

The hospital committee held another meeting last night, at which the county agreement was freely discussed. The proposal made before the city council was, on motion of the mayor, changed a little, so as to be more readily understood, and reads as follows: "That the joint investment in the hospital be fixed at \$15,000, the county to subscribe \$15,000, being one-fifth of the amount of the capital investment in said hospital, to pay actual cost per day per patient. The city to charge as maintenance each year 2 1/2 per cent on the capital of \$15,000, and cost of all repairs, both ordinary and extraordinary, for keeping the building in first-class condition. The county to be allowed the same rate of interest on its investment. The agreement to be terminated in 20 years on either corporation giving notice of its intention so to do, when the county will be paid back by the city the amount of its investment. This agreement to be presented to the county representatives today, and if they deem it prudent, a special meeting of the county council will be held on Wednesday next, when definite action will be taken. There is a strong feeling among the city members that the county will not put up the \$15,000.

Among the communications was a letter from Mrs. H. A. Bommer, in which she said that at a meeting of the executive board of the Local Council of Women, held on Aug. 20, her action in asking the hospital building committee to accept the lowest tenders and to proceed as soon as possible with the children's wing of the Jubilee Hospital was unanimously and heartily endorsed. The statement forwarded to her for the consideration of the members had staggered them when they found that it exceeded by over \$300 the previously estimated limit of \$4,000. As it was a matter of such great importance, it was felt that the very best material and work should be provided, and that no time should be lost in getting the building under way. A committee appointed asked that a meeting with the architect and contractors be arranged, with a view of learning if some reduction could not be made in their terms.

The matter was referred to the architect. Contractors Martin & Hammett stated that they were anxious to complete their contract, and should be allowed to take down some of the old building and use the material. Delay in putting on necessary work in buildings erected was hindering them. If this continued the contract could not be completed by the specified time, and they could not reasonably be held liable.

Architect McBride explained that although he had the matter in hand he was not responsible, as the engineer had instructed him not to execute the contracts until the tenders for heating and plumbing had been accepted. The letter was filed.

It was decided, on motion of Ald. Jolly, that the contract for heating and plumbing should be drawn up and executed, and specify that the work be done on with only the extent of \$5,000 for heating and \$5,000 for plumbing, thus completing the contagious diseases building.

The representatives of the London Electrical Construction Company complained of unfair treatment in the matter of tenders for generators for the hospital, as their tender was \$20 lower than the one accepted. This was the result of a misunderstanding about where the generators were built, the committee being under the impression that they were manufactured in the United States. The matter was laid over.

Contractor Chambers was ordered to supply a copy of the plans and specifications upon which he had tendered to Architect McBride.

MORE GOLD DUST

Another Batch of Fortune Hunters Reach Seattle.

Somewhere About \$1,500,000 of the Precious Stuff Brought Down by the Ferry—More Experience Than Gold Felt to the Lot of Many.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 1.—The steamer Roanoke, from St. Michael, Alaska, has arrived with 450 passengers and gold dust, which a conservative estimation places at \$1,500,000.

The bulk of it was the property of the Canadian Bank of Commerce and the North American Trading and Transportation Company. The amount consigned to the Canadian Bank of Commerce is \$900,000. A majority of the passengers were men who went to Dawson in last year's rush. They have no gold, but lots of experience.

The fortunate passengers numbered about 75. Of these probably 25 had over \$10,000 each. The amounts held by the remainder fifty range from \$10,000 to \$50,000. The following is a list of the richest ones and the amounts they brought back: M. J. Jenkins, \$23,000; Theodore Anderson, \$20,000; George Carmack, \$35,000; Slick Jim, \$25,000; Tagish Charley, \$25,000; Ike Powers, \$15,000; H. Doane, \$15,000; F. Renaud, \$15,000. These men were among the first who went to the Klondike. Slick Jim was the discoverer of the Carmack. He located the first claim on Bonanza Creek. Slick Jim and Tagish Charley are full-blooded Indians.

P. B. Weare estimates the amount of gold dust and drafts brought down on the steamer Roanoke at \$1,000,000. The steamer Portland was to have sailed for San Francisco the day after the Roanoke left St. Michael. It was

reported that she would carry a large amount of gold, the Canadian Bank of Commerce alone shipping over a million dollars.

Toronto, Sept. 1.—The first report from Rev. James Turner, the pioneer Methodist missionary to the Klondike, has been received by Rev. Dr. Sutcliffe, general secretary of the church. It states that owing to the great cost of reaching the region the majority of people are unable to contribute to the mission fund, while the cost of carrying the missionaries is a heavy burden. The contributions actually received are a whole, he states that there is enough wealth in sight in the creeks around Dawson City to make that place a busy center for several years.

POLITICAL POINTS

List of Cases Postponed and Those Awaiting Hearing.

The Minerve, which suspended publication nearly a year ago, appears again in Montreal as the French Conservative organ.

The court of appeal has decided to hear argument on Sept. 13 in the case in regard to the right of polling booth constables to vote in provincial elections.

Judge Osler gave judgment in the case of the South Ontario election protest, which Wallace Nesbitt asked to have set aside on the ground that the petitioner was an alien, and also that he had signed the petition in ignorance of its contents. Judge Osler decided in favor of Mr. Nesbitt, but the petitioners are allowed to substitute another.

A new society has been formed in Toronto, which the members say will be province wide in the extent of its influence. It is known as the Catholic Registration Society. The object of it is to have every Catholic vote in the provincial voters' lists registered. The election is not to direct that vote, and the society is non-partisan. The promoters say that at least Catholics that often many Catholics are without votes.

Railway Laborer Crushed to Death at Hamilton.

Boy Drowned in the Don—Three Five-men Hurt—Fatal Runaway.

PLAYED WITH POWDER.

Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 1.—Archie Denburg, 8 years of age, sprinkled powder on the sidewalk, and while he was stooping over it a companion named Blachford set it off. Young Denburg had his face almost blown off by the explosion. He will lose the sight of one eye, and be badly scarred for life.

DROWNED.

Toronto, Sept. 1.—Johnny Rolph, 7-year-old son of Wm. Rolph, a laborer living on Fee Place, was drowned in the Don yesterday afternoon. The little fellow, along with some other boys, was walking along the river, which had been raised by the recent rain, when the upper portion, which had decayed, gave way, and the lad slipped into the river.

FIREMEN HURT.

Toronto, Sept. 1.—A fire broke out yesterday in a stable in rear of 150 St. George street, at which three firemen were injured by the falling in of the roof. The injured men are: Jack Taggart, badly injured internally; E. Robinson, hurt about the head; and J. Farley, badly bruised. The fire did about \$1,000 damage.

KILLED WHILE DRIVING.

Owen Sound, Sept. 1.—Mr. E. E. Eye, a widow of Arran, was killed last evening by the horse she was driving taking fright at something on the road.

MANGLED.

Hamilton, Sept. 1.—Nick Sheffery, one of a gang of Italian employed by the G. T. R. train near Stone Creek, was instantly killed in a place yesterday. His head struck a post close to the track, and was smashed to a pulp and almost torn from his body.

PORT MAITLAND SHOOTING AFFAIR.

Dunville, Sept. 1.—Dillie Thompson, who was arrested on a charge of shooting two young men named James and Henry Siddall, at Port Maitland last Monday in a dispute over putting up a line fence, was given a hearing before Magistrate Taylor. Thompson pleaded guilty, but made the statement that it was self-defense. He was fined \$10 or 10 days imprisonment for pointing a gun at Robert Siddall, and committed for trial at Cayuga to answer the charge of shooting James and Henry Siddall with intent to kill. In the shooting affray, James Siddall was shot in the right wrist, badly lacerating it. Henry was struck in the chest by a number of spent shot, but was not seriously hurt.

SOUTHERN STORM

Proves Very Disastrous to Property in Savannah, Ga.—Wind 75 Miles an Hour.

Savannah, Ga., Aug. 31.—A heavy storm is sweeping along the coast. The wind at Savannah has blown since 9 o'clock last night, reaching a velocity of about 60 miles an hour. The low lands are flooded, and the damage to rice and cotton will be heavy. The railroads approaching the city are washed out, and trains on all roads are blocked. At 4 o'clock this morning the wind reached a velocity of 75 MILES AN HOUR.

The rain is pouring in torrents. The streets are filled with debris. The last report from Tybee said the wind was blowing 75 miles an hour, and the operator at the lighthouse found communication with Tybee, Georgia's seaside resort, cannot be had at this hour. There are about 500 people at Tybee. The North Carolina troops are there.

THEIR APPEARANCE. Roofs of houses are scattered through the streets and in the public squares. The light and street car systems make the streets impassable for vehicles. The loss to property owners will be fully \$500,000. The rice crop will be lost. So far as can be learned, no lives were lost in the gale, that is, directly in this city. The adjoining islands are to be visited. From the communication with Tybee, Georgia's seaside resort, cannot be had at this hour. There are about 500 people at Tybee.
