
THE SITE SELECTED FOR THE MONU MENT AT LOUISBURG.

To be Erected by the Society of the Colon' ial Wars on the Ruins of the Old King's Bastion and Citadel-Something About

Almost every Canadian is more or less acquainted with the history of Louisburg, that fortified city of Cape Breton upon which the French had lavished 30,000,000 lires and spent twenty years in building, and in comparison with which the other fortified points on the continent, as Havana, Panama and Carthagena, sunk into insignificance. So perfect was the work on the "Dunkirk of America" thought to be that the French engineers employed in its construction were wonf

to boast that it could be defended by a garrison of women. From the earliest times Louisburg was known as Havre de l'Anglois, but no settlement of any importance was established there until after the treaty of Utrecht in 1713, which ceded the island of Cape Breton to France. In 1720 the famous fortification was begun, and a little better than twenty years thereafter was completed. Against an attack from sea it was considered practically impregnable, and little thought appears to have been given to the land approaches, as it was largely marsh, across which it was deemed impossible to transport heavy cannon,

without which the subjection of Louisburg could never have been accomplished. The illustration accompanying this article shows that the old French city and



point of the harbor, very nearly opposite the site of the present village, which has begun to take on an air of importance since it was transformed into an import-

ant coal shipping port. It is at this place, then, on the afternoon of June 17, that the Society of the Colonial Wars and their friends mean to dedicate a monument to the memory of those who fell at the capture of Louisburg, so that no New Englander who visits there in the future will have occasion to blush when he wanders through the old burial ground at Point Rochfort, where 500 colonists lie buried, and whose resting place has hitherto been unmarked,


except by the ruins which are all about The monument which will be erected is of granite, and was manufactured by Messy Epps Dodds & Co. of St. George, N. D. It is a Tuscan column, surmounted by a cannon ball of victory, and stands on a pedestal on which are inscriptions which suitably commemorate an event so famous in old colonial annals. The die, column and ball are polished, the rest axed, and the height is twenty-six feet. On the die are the following in-

scriptions: On the front, in 11/4 inch leters, "To Commemorate the Capture of Louisburg, A.D. 1745. Erected by the Society of Colonial Wars.'

On the back, in four-inch letters: "To

Our Heroic Dead. " On the left side, in 11/4 inch letters: "French Forces, 2500 Regulars, Militia and Seamen, under Gov. Duchambon." On the right side, in 11/4-inch letters: "Provincial Forces, Massachusetts Bay, Connecticut, New Hampshire, 4000 men. under Lieut.-Gen. Pepperrell. British Fleet, ten sail, 500 guns, under Commodore Warren, Provincial Fleet, sixteen

armed vessels, ninety transports, 240 guns, under Capt. Tyng." The site selected for the erection of the monument is on the ruins of the old King's bastion and citadel, as indicated by the letter "A" in the illustration of the old town, which is taken from a little wooden model recently made of the fortifications. Notwithstanding the tons of



powder which have been exploded beside and beneath them, much still remains of the massive earthworks. The old citadel is well defined by the foundation walls where the long range of stone buildings stood. Here were the military offices, officers' quarters and chapels. Through much debris the shattered bomb-proofs can be entered, beneath arches which are monuments to the skill of the masons who constructed them. It was in these dark, damp holes that the women and children were compelled to pass the long and tedious days and nights of the protracted siege. Along the top of these ramparts a walk of a full mile can be taken to the seashore, the average height being about fifty feet above sea level.

The thickness and general solidity is what amazes one about them most. The moat, which was eighty feet wide, is fair-ly well defined, but lapse of years and lack of care are beginning to have their usual effect. It can be easily seen how the besieged, to a large extent, controlled the movements of the besiegers, because, through the immense marsh, it was impossible for soldiers to advance, and consequently it became necessary for the attacking party to concentrate its attention on one or two points. The bomb-proofs are the only real specimens of masonry that can be seen, and the broad, deep excavation of the most and covered way. and the well grassed glacis, bid fair to hold together for still another century.
