BLAKE WAS UNOPPOSED

In His Candidacy for South Longford.

Conservatives Gain 21 Seats and the Liberals 14.

Unknown Land Found by Amtrup, the Explorer, Who has Returned From Greenland.

London, Friday, Oct. 5-4 a.m.—The parliamentary election returns received up to midnight showed the total number of candidates elected to be 347, with the relative strength of the parties as follows:

Ministerialists ..... 250 Liberals, including Laborites ..... 72 Nationalists ..... 45

The Conservatives have gained altogether 21 seats and the Liberals 14. Hon. Edward Blake, the Canadian, has been returned unopposed by the Irish Nationalists for the south division of Longford, which he represented in the last parliament.

OTHER RETURNS. The following was the polling for East Birmingham: Sir J. Benjamin Stone (Conservative), 4,989; J. V. Stevens (Liberal), 2,355.

In the Scotland division of Liverpool Mr. T. P. O'Connor, who has represented the constituency since 1885, was re-elected. The polling follows: Thomas Power O'Connor (Irish Nationalist), 2,044; W. Rutherford (Conservative), 1,844.

In the other Liverpool boroughs the Conservatives gained largely. In the Central division of Leeds, as follows: H. S. Gaultier (Conservative), 3,453; J. Rockford-Maguire (Liberal), 1,586; W. P. Byles (Laborite), 1,266.

Another Conservative gain has been made at Burnley, where Sir Philip Stanhope has been defeated by Mr. Mitchell, the Conservative candidate, by 500 votes; W. P. Mitchell (Conservative), 6,773; Sir Philip Stanhope (Liberal), 6,273.

At Hanley, Mr. Arthur H. Heath (Conservative) carried the election, receiving 6,588 votes, as against 5,944 for Mr. Enoch Edwards (Liberal).

The Liberal hold Whitechapel, where one of the closest of the London contests has been fought. Mr. S. M. Samuel received 1,873 votes, as against 1,608 cast for his Conservative opponent, Mr. D. H. Kyd.

In the Central division of London the Conservatives heavily increased their vote, gaining seats at Stepney and Hoxton. In the former borough, Mr. W. E. Gordon received 2,783 votes, as against 2,595 cast for the Liberal candidate, Mr. W. S. Steadman, secretary of the Barge Builders' Trade Union. In Hoxton, Hon. Claude (Conservative) received 2,866 votes, as against 2,595 cast for his Liberal opponent, Prof. James Stuart.

In West Southwark, Sir A. J. Newton, lord mayor of London, was defeated by Mr. Richard K. Gauston. The polling was as follows: Richard Knight Gauston (Liberal), 2,832; Sir A. J. Newton (Conservative), 2,763.

The Ministerialists have gained two seats in the Blackfriars and Bridgton divisions. In the former, Mr. A. Bonar Law received 4,140 votes against 3,140 cast for his Liberal opponent, Mr. A. D. Provand, and in the latter, Mr. J. D. Mackenzie (Conservative) received 5,022, as against 4,703 cast for the Liberal candidate, Prof. Munro.

At Portsmouth the Conservatives have also gained two seats, the polling being as follows: J. T. Majendie (Conservative), 10,818; R. G. Bramson (Liberal), 10,214; Sir John Baker (Liberal), 10,931.

In the East division of London, Mr. S. Ford Ridley (Conservative) polled 3,418 votes, Mr. Edward H. Pickersgill (Liberal), who had represented the division since 1885, 2,832, and Mr. A. Conard (Liberal), 2,595.

In the Central division of Edinburgh Mr. D. A. Conard (Liberal) polled 3,418 votes, Mr. G. M. Brown (Liberal), who received 3,023 votes, as against 2,439 cast for Dr. Doyle.

In Haggerston, London, Mr. W. R. Cremer (Liberal) carried the election, receiving 2,294 votes, as against 2,200 cast for his Conservative opponent, Mr. John Loves.

A double-barreled Liberal and a Conservative election in the polling for this "double-barreled" borough being as follows: Sir Joseph Leigh (Liberal), 5,958; Beresford V. Millville (Conservative), 5,277; E. Green (Liberal), 5,209; Dr. Hillier (Conservative), 5,233.

South Edinburgh was carried as at the election of 1895, by the Liberal-Unionists. In that contest their majority was 87. Today Mr. Arthur Dewar (Liberal) carried the seat at the bye-election last year, was defeated by 111 votes, the polling being as follows: Sir A. N. Agnew (Liberal-Unionist), 5,766; Arthur Dewar (Liberal), 5,655.

In the "double-barreled" borough of Southampton the Ministerialists captured one seat and held the other, the polling being as follows: T. Chamberlayne (Liberal-Unionist) defeated Mr. S. B. Simeon (Liberal-Unionist), 5,233; Francis H. Evans (Liberal), 5,575; C. G. Hyde (Liberal), 4,552.

In North Camberwell, London, Mr. J. T. McNamara (Liberal) was elected. He received 4,820 votes, as against 6,485 cast for his Conservative opponent, Mr. J. R. Diggle.

Mr. Herbert Gladstone (Liberal) carried West Leeds by a majority of 521. He received 7,043 votes, as against 6,522 cast for his Conservative opponent, Col. T. W. Harding.

Mr. Newcastleton-Lyme, Sir A. F. Haslam (Liberal) carried in the election. He received 7,043 votes, by a vote of 2,750 against 3,653.

UNKNOWN LAND DISCOVERED. Copenhagen, Oct. 5.—Lieut. Amtrup's Greenland expedition has arrived here on board the Antarctic. The members of the expedition explored and mapped an unknown stretch of land extending from Cape Tux, latitude 69 degrees 28 minutes north, to Agassiz Land, 67 degrees 22 minutes north.

FLOODS IN FRANCE. Paris, Oct. 5.—Heavy storms throughout France have done much damage to property and live stock. Many of the rivers are overflowing, devastating wide tracts. The vine-growing districts are greatest sufferers. The vines have been beaten down, and in many cases the crops are almost ruined.

The General carried in the Hauts Pyrenees amounts to a disaster. The situation is so critical in Burgundy, Auvergne, the Rhone and the Saone vineyards that in response to the urgent requests of the growers the

LEON MANGLED A BUTCHER. Paris, Oct. 5.—In the menagerie at a country fair near Privas yesterday a large audience gathered to witness a local butcher enter the lion's cage, play a game of cards with the lion tamer and drink a bottle of champagne.

The performance was successful until the butcher foolishly, and without warning the trainer, approached the lion and held a glass of champagne under his nose, whereupon the lion leaped upon the butcher, ground his shoulder within his jaws and mangled his body fearfully. When the butcher was removed he was almost dead.

In the meanwhile the audience was panic-stricken, and in the stampede to escape from the menagerie many persons were trampled on and badly injured.

FROM THE PHILIPPINES. Manila, Oct. 5.—The new commission yesterday appropriated \$287,000 for the payment of sundry expenses incurred by the military for the benefit of the insular government, during September, and also donated \$1,000 to the widow of the loyal and efficient Filipino president of the town of Santa Cruz, who was murdered by the insurgents. The purpose is to show the United States Government's intention to protect its friends, and faithful servants, the heroes of Panay Island and its civil government, Monday night the rebels killed Lieut. Max Wagner, of the 28th Regiment of Volunteer Infantry, near Pava. A detachment of the 44th Regiment, at Bohol Island, one of the Visayan group, has encountered a force of the enemy, killing 30 of them. One American was killed.
