CANDLE CAUSED FIRE

Ignited a Quantity of Benzine, at King Street Factory.

Fire at the works of the London Spramotor Company, King street, caused about \$300 damage to building and stock last night.

About 9:30 a boy with a candle entered a room where a tank of benzine was stored. The flame of the candle ignited the benzine, and in an instant the room was a mass of flames.

The boy, though badly burned about the hands and arms, gave the alarm, and the fire department responded promptly. Chief Clark and his men were kept busy for a while, but they finally subdued the flames and prevented what threatened to become a serious fire.

Much of the damage was caused by water, as in order to successfully fight the blaze the chief found it necessary to drench the quarter of the building where the fire broke out.

THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO TODAY
(From The London Advertiser of April 17, 1871.)

W. K. Muir, Esq., superintendent, and Mr. Price, treasurer of the Great Western Railway, passed through the city today on a trip to the western terminus of the line.

Professor Fleck, of this city, late bandmaster of the Seventh Battalion, has been engaged to instruct the band of the Twenty-sixth Battalion, at Stratford. Under Mr. Fleck's instruction the band, which of late has deteriorated somewhat, expects in a short time to be in a position to appear in public.

The first fair held at Mount Brydges came off on the 13th inst., and was well attended by buyers, but there were very few sellers, those having stock to sell apparently thinking that, being the first fair, buyers would be scarce. The principal purchasers were: Messrs. McDougall, Lobo; Shipley, Williams, McGugan, Caradoc, McLane, Lobo, and Kroman, Caradoc. Mr. Charles Murray showed a combined reaper and mower and made sale of the same.

The sugar festival in the Methodist Episcopal Church last night was patronized by a respectable audience. The whole affair passed off in the most agreeable manner. Hot sugar and fruit were bountifully dispensed. Excellent speeches were made by Revs. Palmer, Griffith, Benson, Joffe and Lawrence. Mr. J. W. Jones, of the Commercial College, presided ably. The choir furnished first-class music. The proceeds, which must have been quite handsome, were donated to the pastor, Rev. S. Williamson, who has just completed his second year with this church. They expect to retain him another year.

We are glad to be able to inform our readers that the fences and gates around the cricket square are now thoroughly repaired. The old swing gates have been removed at each corner, and strong turnstiles substituted. The ground will be thoroughly cleaned today. The London Cricket Club will commence practice at once. The club has been at a great
