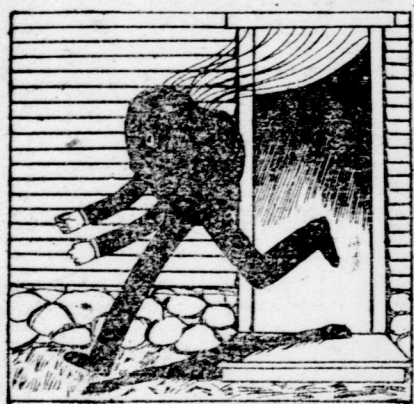

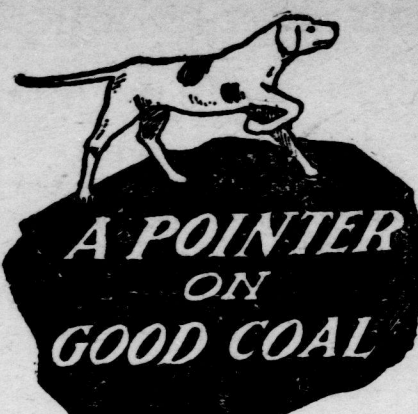

YOUNG PEOPLE'S RALLY

Local Baptist Societies Meet at Talbot Street Church.

MISSING MAN FOUND

Francesco Framene, Aged Italian, Wandered to Komoka.

About 6 o'clock last night Francesco Framene, the aged Italian who disappeared from his home in this city, was located near Komoka, and restored to his relatives.

A G. T. R. flagman at Komoka had read an account of the disappearance of the old man in the London papers, and was convinced that he had been harboring the man in his shanty. He immediately telegraphed to the city police and sent Mr. Framene back to the city on the eastern flyer. A large party of Italians gathered on the station to meet the old man, and there was great rejoicing over his return. It appears that Mr. Framene lost his way en route to his sister's on Sunday morning, and that he wandered through South London into the country, where he strayed through the fields and woods for some time. He eventually found his way to the Grand Trunk tracks, and became completely mixed up in the directions, for, instead of turning toward the east, as he should have done, he turned west and arrived in Komoka, being unable to speak English, he could not explain to anyone where he had come from, and was in a bad fix until he found a friend in the flagman, who allowed him to sleep in his bunk, gave him food and took care of him.

THE RUSSIAN BUDGET

A Loan Contemplated to Meet Expenditure of 1907.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 14.—A communication, issued by Minister of Finance Kokovtsov, says that owing to the dissolution of parliament and the adjournment of the council of the empire until March 5, the budget proposals cannot be considered in time to allow the publication of the budget Jan. 14, as in previous years.

The council of ministers accordingly decided that the budget shall, without fail, be submitted to Parliament and the council of the empire March 5. Meantime the council of ministers has decided to be governed by the article in the constitution which says that if a budget is not confirmed at the beginning of a financial year, then the budget of the preceding year shall remain in force, and which permits a credit to be opened for the different departments not exceeding one-twelfth of the total budget expenditure.

Confering with the different departments the total ordinary and extraordinary expenditure for the current year, based on the budget for 1906 was fixed roughly at \$1,250,000,000.

The total expenditure is increased by \$22,500,000, representing an obligatory expenditure of the exchequer in carrying out the laws passed after the adoption of the 1906 budget.

The ordinary receipts are estimated at \$1,087,500,000, and are expected to show an increase of \$75,000,000 over those of 1906. The ordinary expenditure is put down at \$1,085,500,000, or an increase of \$7,500,000 over 1906.

The total extraordinary expenditure for 1907 is estimated at \$149,300,000, to meet which a loan operation is contemplated, the magnitude of which depends on the revenue of 1907.

TRACKING MISSING LINK

Hands and Feet Shaped Similarly to Those of Simians.

Berlin, Jan. 14.—An interesting discovery has been made by the well-known Heidelberg scientist, Professor Klaatsch, who is now pursuing anthropological studies in Australia.

Writing in the Koelner Zeitung, the professor says that while examining some Australasian natives arrested for killing a white man in Port Arthur he found that one of the men had feet and hands of exactly the same shape and appearance as those of monkeys.

The natives on his inquiries, stated that in the hitherto unexplored regions between the Rivers Daly and Victoria numerous people have similar hands and feet, and otherwise bear a strong resemblance to large monkeys. This is the first time that these characteristics have been discovered in a human being.

Prof. Klaatsch is now starting for the region where these natives are to be found, in order to verify the above statement. The discovery has awakened great interest in the German scientific world as it is a striking testimony in favor of the Darwinian theory of the missing link.

DECIDES AGAINST HEARST

Supreme Court Gives Ballot Boxes to Election Board.

New York, Jan. 15.—The ballot boxes containing the ballots cast for mayor in the city election in 1906 were today ordered by Justice Leventritt to be placed in the custody of the New York City
