Visiting in London.
Mr. Joseph Coombs, of Prince Albert, is on a visit to relatives and friends in this city. Mr. Coombs is one of the few survivors of the band of 45 men who during the Northwest rebellion were captured by Louis Riel and confined in old Fort Garry. William Scott, another of the 45, was shot a few days after the capture. Mr. Coombs has not been in London for a great many years.

Mrs. Motley Dead.
Mrs. Louisa Motley, wife of Mr. Jas. Motley, 92 King street, died in Victoria Hospital yesterday after a brief illness. Last week while down town Mrs. Motley fell and fractured her hip and never recovered from the shock. She was 75 years old, and besides her husband is survived by one son, Mr. T. J. Motley, of 555 Ridout street, and

one daughter, Mrs. B. FitzWalters, of Emery street. The funeral, which will be a private nature, will be held to Mount Pleasant Cemetery on Wednesday afternoon, the services being conducted by Rev. W. H. Claris.

Fractured His Arm.
Mr. K. G. Tyler, of St. Thomas, sustained a double fracture of the right arm at Queen's Park, yesterday morning, by Prince Albert, a horse belonging to Dr. Ramsay, of St. Thomas, falling on him. Mr. Tyler was endeavoring to jump one of the hurdles, when his horse missed and fell. Mr. Tyler was unable to extricate himself and the animal fell heavily on him, fracturing the arm at the wrist and elbow, besides bruising him very badly. Drs. Seaborne and Lindsay dressed the injury.

Laid at Rest.
The funeral of the late Mrs. Margaret Hudson, whose death occurred on Saturday after a painful illness of several months, which she bore with Christian fortitude, was held from the family residence 233 Hyman street, on Monday afternoon. The service was conducted by Rev. A. J. Vining, pastor of Talbot Street Baptist Church, of which the deceased was an active member, taking a deep interest in all departments and endeavoring herself to both young and old by her quiet Christian life. Friends of the family were present from Chicago, Kalamazoo and Brantford. Many beautiful floral tributes were sent from friends. The pallbearers were Messrs. Jepson, Dale, Lamb, Matthews, Finch and Peel.

The Late Wm. Ewart.
Mr. Wm. Ewart, a pioneer resident of Ingersoll, died at his residence, King street east, Ingersoll, on Monday, aged 80 years. The late Wm. Ewart was born at Haddington, Scotland. At the age of 19 he came to Canada, and was in Toronto for about six years, when he removed to Ingersoll. During the early days of Ingersoll Mr. Ewart was associated in business with the late J. Balmer. Later he was private secretary to the late Adam Oliver, M. P. He was secretary of Samaritan Lodge, I. O. O. F., over 25 years, and was for some time auditor of the town. He ceased to be survived by three daughters — Mrs. Robert D. McDonald, London; Mrs. A. Rolfe, of Denver, Col., and Miss E. Ewart, at home. The funeral will take place under Masonic auspices on Wednesday afternoon to the Ingersoll rural cemetery.

The New Governors.
The governors appointed by the council will meet with the approval of citizens in general. It is understood that the appointment of the mayor means that each year the occupant of the chair will have a seat on the board of governors of the university.

Mr. Samuel Stevely, mayor of London, is one of the city's best-known merchants and is largely interested in other enterprises in this city and elsewhere. He has held many offices in the gift of the people, and in January last was elevated to the mayoralty.

Mr. R. C. Struthers is the well-known wholesale dry goods merchant of Richmond street. He has never sought an office in the public service, but has ways taken a keen interest in the affairs of the city, and his practical ability will be of great value to the university.

Mr. T. H. Smallman is the head of the Canada Chemical Company, vice-president of the London Street Railway Company, and one of the most prominent and successful business men in Canada. His association with the university cannot but be helpful to that institution.

Mr. T. J. Murphy is a member of the law firm of McKillop & Murphy, a captain in the Seventh Regiment, a member of a couple of Blesley rifle teams, and one of the best shots with a rifle in the British empire. He is a man of ripe learning, with a real interest in education, having been a member of the teaching profession before he entered law.

DEATH OF JOHN O'BRIEN
He Was a Well-Known Figure on the London Market.

Mr. John O'Brien, one of the best-known figures on London market, died at his home, 41 Oxford street, West London, yesterday afternoon, after an illness extending over a year.

Mr. O'Brien was born on Bathurst street 71 years ago, but for many years he had been engaged in farming just west of the city. He was known and esteemed by a wide circle of friends throughout the city and country. Last year, owing to illness, Mr. O'Brien retired, and had been residing in the city.

Besides his wife, Mr. O'Brien is survived by six sons and two daughters, Thomas, John C., Charles H., Frank K., of London Township; Joseph and W. L.

Ham J., of West London; Mrs. C. Elliott, of West London, and Miss Lizzie at home.

The funeral will be held on Wednesday morning to St. Peter's Cathedral, interment being made at St. Peter's Cemetery.

PRIME CONDITION

OF THE ANIMALS

Nearly a Thousand Entries of Horses at the Fair—Great Poultry Show.

The Live Stock Department of the Western Fair of 1908 will go down in history as the best yet, both as to quality and quantity. A very notable feature of this department this year was the prime condition of all animals from one end of the exhibition to the other, owing no doubt to the good pasture and heavy crops of the past season.

In horses there are in the neighborhood of 1,000 entries, and every available stall is occupied. Judging started yesterday in this department, but today lovers of horse flesh had a chance to see the ribbons placed. The judging took place in the ring east of the cattle sheds.

Yesterday was washing day among the cattle men. Bright and early in the morning they were to be seen with pail and brush scrubbing and washing each animal so that they would be in readiness for the judges. Below will be found a few of the principal exhibitors:

In the Cattle Sheds.
In Shorthorns, Captain Robson, of Ilderton, shows a fine herd.

George H. Oke is a large exhibitor in Scotch Shorthorns.

Hereforders are a splendid class. J. A. Govenlock, of Forest, comes strong as usual.

Ayrshires are a strong class, and a big exhibit. Alex. Hume and William Stewart, of Menie, Ont., also, Hunter & Sons, of Maxville, Ont., are the heaviest exhibitors.

B. M. Bull & Sons, of Brampton, show a large herd of Jersey.

A splendid exhibit of Guernsey and French Canadian cattle comes from far away Quebec, Guy Carr, of Maple Ridge Farm, being the exhibitor.

Holsteins are shown by E. Laidlaw & Sons, of Aylmer.

Hulet & Dunkin, Norwich, and G. W. Clemons, St. George, show fine herds.

Hogs.
Never before in the history of the Fair has there been such a fine exhibit of hogs. Every pen is full and the quality is without exception the finest ever seen in the Western.

Sheep.
Sheep are fully up to former years. In some classes there is a decided improvement.

Poultry.
This department is where the Western Fair excels. With an entry list of 1,700 birds, and the best quality show ever cooped in the western part of the province. Lovers of poultry have a splendid opportunity of being educated up to understand what a "standard-bred bird" means. In some classes there has been a decided improvement, which is chiefly noticeable in the White Minorca and White Wyandotte class.

Buff Orpingtons head the list with the largest entry, some 60 birds competing. The best birds in this class arrived too late to be judged, but were easy winners.

White Rocks are a fine class, a number of high-class birds competing.

The Barred Rocks are not up to former years in quality, taking the exhibit as a whole, although there are some birds of rare excellence. Ed. Hocken, London, wins well in this class.

In White Wyandottes the exhibit is the best ever shown in London.

Pyle Games form a large class of splendid birds.

In Poland is where Wm. McNeill shines, winning nearly everything.

The Black Cochins Bantams class is a creditable one indeed. These birds are much admired for their fine appearance.

Black Orpingtons, one of the handsomest breeds in existence, are a good class, some 30 odd birds competing.

J. R. Hamilton, London, won for first cock, second hen, and third cockerel.

Kemp & Waterman, London, win second and third cock; first and second hen; second cockerel, and second pullet.

Hier & Taylor, third pullets.

A number of good birds were not placed.
