Ryan is slowly sinking, and his death is but a matter of hours. He is in a semi-conscious condition, there is no hope for his recovery.

"His lower limbs are terribly crushed," said Dr. Drake. "He was caught between the two engines, and his legs were litérally smashed to pieces. It would have been necessary to amputate both legs above the knee, had there been any chance of saving his life from the beginning. I contemplated that, but his condition was so bad that we could not do so. His system would not stand the shock. He is injured internally, and his death is but a matter of hours."
