ALLEGED GOLD BRICK SCHEME
Letter From Detroit Purposes to Tell of a Gold Mine Down the River.
AN ALLEGED CONSPIRACY
To Defraud the People of London Including the Worthy Mayor, Mr. J. H. A. Beattie.

The citizens of London have had a narrow escape from being flim-flamed, it is said.
Mayor Beattie received an alleged confession from one of the "conspirators" today, and this probably saved a large number of people from being taken in by the scheme.
It will be remembered that some days ago his worship received a letter from a lady, conveying the information that a valuable gold mine was located down the river, and that she would disclose its location for a consideration.

ALLEGED EXPLANATION.
Today a mining engineer from Montana, who has been in Detroit lately, writes, explaining the scheme, according to his letter.
Some time ago he was approached by a man said to own a farm down the River Thames. This man unfolded to him the story that he had written to a woman in the west, who had written in turn to Mayor Beattie, informing him of the gold mine in the river.

THE ALLEGED SCHEME.
The woman followed out her instructions, it is alleged, and wrote concerning the mine. The expert figured out that he was not going to be caught in a fine-dam game, and wrote explaining his connection with the case.
He left for Chicago on his way back to Montana, saying that he would not become connected with a skin game of this sort.

THE POWER STATION.

LADY MISSIONARY DIED ON WAY TO FIELD OF LABOR IN CHINA

Cable to Rev. A. K. Birks Announces the Death of Mrs. J. L. Stewart, Who Was Married in September Last and Left With Her Husband for the Foreign Fields in October.

With many months of journeying behind, and only a week's journey before, Mrs. J. L. Stewart, who was formerly Miss Cordelia Dunkin, daughter of Mr. John Dunkin, of 219 Wortley road, laid down her life in an alien land, never having seen the field to which she was going to spend her life as a missionary.
A brief message received Saturday afternoon at the home of Rev. A. K. Birks, and dated Chung King, West China, Jan. 22, bearing the simple words, "Cordelia Stewart died here today," is practically all that is known of the sad fact.
No intimation had been given in any of the letters sent home from the members of the party that all was not well, and the sad news came with terrible suddenness. All Mrs. Stewart's letters home have been full of the pleasant little incidents of the journey, and were always bright and cheerful, and the thought of any disaster had come to trouble the heart of her parents until Saturday's telegram brought the news of her death.

Mr. Birks Receives News.
Chung King is the station of the General Mission, reached after months of journeying up the Yang Tze Kiang by house boat. At that place it is learned from Rev. Mr. Mortimore, a returned missionary, at present in the city, that Mrs. Stewart, one of the best women he had seen in West China, and as there were several medical men in the party with which Rev. Mr. Stewart was travelling, she could not have needed medical care.
Mr. Birks was not at home when the telegram announcing the sad intelligence arrived, and it was some little time before he could hear the news, together with Rev. Mr. Mortimore, they

NIAGARA POWER HERE JULY 1

So Mr. Beck Stated to the Water Commissioners on Saturday.

CITY WILL NOT BE READY
To Distribute the Energy—Man To Be Appointed To Trim Trees For the Wires.

Niagara power will be ready for London before July 1.
This was stated at the meeting of the water commissioners on Saturday afternoon. Mr. Beck said that this would be the very latest date, and that the power would be in London much before that time.
The question when the current would be turned on was asked when Mr. Sifton advised that the time for receiving tenders for the power station equipment be made Feb. 26, rather than Feb. 1, at present. This would give the English the opportunity of tendering on the equipment.
"We had better wait until we find out when power will be here," said Mayor Beattie.

Here July 1.
"Power will be here before we are ready, in any event," answered Mr. Pocock. "We will not be prepared to use it before July 1, and it will be ready for us long before that. I suggest that the time for receiving tenders be made Feb. 26 in order to give the English firms a chance to tender."
"When will power be in London?" Mr. Beck was asked by Mayor Beattie. "Before July 1," answered Mr. Beck. "I will be here before then," commented Chief Engineer Southman.
The time, as suggested by Mr. Pocock, for receiving tenders, was agreed to by the commissioners, Feb. 26.
"We are being held up now because the trees are not trimmed," said Engineer Sifton. "We could trim wires immediately were it not that we must cut the limbs of the trees."

Cost of Coal.
"Of the \$318,111 paid for coal for the year 1909, the Ontario Government paid 25 per cent, or \$209,925. Of the remainder the city of London's share under the amortized agreement of 1903 (84 per cent) was \$511,632, and the city's share, 16 per cent, or \$97,452.
These conditions, which have been repeatedly contended, have now been reported to the auditor.

"During the past year a new roof was put on the 3rd, but the work was so hurried that in such a manner that the roof is already leaking badly. I found 42 suits of clothing in good condition of repair.

Prisoners' Food.
"The prisoners are provided with wholesome food in accordance with the regulations. There are no complaints in regard to the quality of the food supplied. The cost of rations for the last quarter was .07 per ration. The supplies are obtained by contract.
"On examining the books I found the entries were properly made and up-to-date.
"The care of the jail and the custody of the prisoners require the whole time and attention of the jailer. The satisfactory condition in which all

ONTARIO LEGISLATURE WILL GATHER TOMORROW

Second Session of Twelfth Parliament Called to Queen's Park.

Toronto, Jan. 24.—The second session of the twelfth Parliament of Ontario, which opens with all the customary ceremonial and social eclat on Tuesday, will drop at once into provincial business. The change in the financial year has enabled the Government to make material progress in the preparation of its legislation.
The speech from the throne, in which his honor communicates to the House the more important legislative proposals, promises to be an unusually interesting document, and the inaugural debate upon it will probably require the balance of the present week. It will be precipitated by the resolution of Mr. T. Herbert Lennox, member for North York, who will move a formal reply to the speech. Mr. Albert Grigg, the new member for Algoma, will second the resolution.
The rearrangement of seating has been carried out in accordance with the plan forecasted last week. Temporary partitions have been erected throughout the burned wings of the building which will provide better committee accommodation than was at first deemed possible.
The committee will probably be organized early next week, and few changes in chairmanships are considered likely.
The vacancy caused by the death of J. H. Carnegie, chairman of the public accounts committee, is the only one to be filled.

MONTEREY STOCK DEAL

Montreal, Jan. 24.—A deal has just been consummated whereby a group of capitalists and Toronto capitalists have purchased a large block of the preferred stock of the Montreal Railway, Light and Power Company from Messrs. G. W. White & Co., and M. W. Halsey, of New York, who originally secured it in payment for the lighting plant.
The company controls, in addition to the street railway and electric lighting, the city water and sewage systems of the city of Montreal.
The capitalization of the company is \$1,000,000, or 5 per cent, first mortgage debenture stock, which is held almost entirely in England, \$500,000 of convertible preference stock, which is now held by this deal in Montreal and Toronto, and \$4,000,000 of common stock.
