AUSTRIA FORTIFIES
ITALIAN FRONTIER

Also Masses Troops Ready For Invasion—Neutrality Nears End.

(Canadian Press.)
ROME (via Paris), April 20.—7:05 p.m.—Reports received here today from Austria say that the dual monarchy is hurriedly gathering troops on the Italian frontier to face a possible invasion by Italian soldiers.

A large contingent of Austrian troops, the reports say, have been quartered at Montebelluna, Treviso and Sagrado. The Austrians also are said to have strongly fortified the whole line of the Isonzo River with entrenchments, behind which batteries already are in position. The Messagero says that Michael Deger, the new Russian Ambassador to Italy, is delaying his arrival in Rome because of his desire before leaving Petrograd to arrange with his own Government for the conclusion of a thorough agreement between Russia and Italy not only concerning Italy's intervention in the war, but with regard to Italy's position when peace is reached.

Neutrality Nears End.
The Messagero adds that an almost perfect accord continues to exist between Italy and Roumania and that therefore Italy's neutrality is approaching end, although nobody knows the day that Italy will enter upon hostilities.

"We would be blind still to hope for a good result from the Vienna conversations," the Messagero continues. "This has been a dilatory game. It was proposed by Prince Von Buelow, the German ambassador, and accepted by Austria and Italy, because for various reasons both countries considered it convenient to postpone the day of reckoning."

ENEMY HAS LOST
ATTACK ADVANTAGE

Capture of Les Eparges By French An Important Gain.

LONDON, April 21.—3:20 a.m.—A correspondent of the Times in "Eastern France," summing up the fighting about the St. Mihiel wedge, says:

"The net result of the autumn and winter campaign is that the Germans have lost their initial advantage of attack and their line is now being besieged by the French."

The correspondent emphasizes the importance of the capture of Les Eparges "in the teeth of the German Crown Prince," and notes that the French "are steadily pushing forward from Verdun toward Metz." He says that the strength of the German positions in the Toul-Verdun barrier of fortresses is now more apparent than real.

"It seems to be certain," he adds, "that the Germans have begun to withdraw their heavy guns from Camp Des Romains. Confirmation of this would be important, because it would be impossible for the French to occupy St. Mihiel, even if the rumors that the Germans have evacuated it are true, unless the Germans also quit Camp Des Romains."

INCENDIARY SHELLS DROPPED ON RHEIMS.

"Fifty incendiary shells have been dropped on Rheims and the Argonne."

BRYAN REBUKES
PEARY IN SPEECH

Idea That United States Must Expand Territory All Wrong.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 20.—Secretary Bryan said today that before criticizing Admiral Peary's recent speech on possible territorial expansion of the United States, he had written the admiral for verification of the reported remarks and received an authenticated copy. Mr. Bryan's comment on the speech, as given out today at the state department, was in part as follows:

"I am sure that the United States is a nation of free speech and so apparent that we are compelled to accept with these advantages the evils that follow from an occasional abuse of the privilege by persons sufficiently prominent to secure publicity for their views. It is to be regretted, however, that a man known to the public should so much enjoy indulging his imagination as to be indifferent to the effect which his utterances may have upon this country's relations with other nations."

Private Opinion.
"Admiral Peary does not, of course, claim to be inspired—he is simply expressing his private opinion, but his name, unfortunately, gives wings to his words. He fixes 100 years as the period during which it will be necessary for this Government to secure control of the continent or disappear. Such a prediction from an obscure man would be foolish; from one in his position it is little less than a crime. His prediction is based upon an assumption which has been demonstrated to be false, namely, that a nation must constantly expand or go into decay."

"It has been a century since the boundary line between the United States and Canada was established and yet both countries are more prosperous today than they were a hundred years ago. This country shares the larger part of North America with several Spanish-speaking republics, and there is no reason why there should be any dispute between them in a century or in many centuries. The idea that a nation can grow only geographically is as un-American as it is untrue."

Said It Before.
Admiral Peary on reading the above comment declined to comment upon or discuss it, but pointed out that he first presented the idea "that the entire North American world segment is the eventual destiny of the United States" in a public address in London in November, 1903, when he said:

"The attainment of the North Pole is particularly an object for American pride and patriotism. The North American world segment is our home, our natural, ultimate destiny. Its bounds are the isthmus and the pole. We are negotiating for the isthmus. We must find and mark the pole."

GERMANY'S STORES
SET IN A BLAZE

French Airmen Bombard the Rhine Stations, Muelheim and Habsheim.

LONDON, April 21.—1:52 a.m.—"Two French aerial squadrons attacked railway stations along the Rhine, Monday afternoon," says the Daily Telegraph's Zurich correspondent, "bombarding successfully the Muelheim and Habsheim stations. The immense storage stores at Mannheim were set on fire and the buildings and contents were completely destroyed."

German Submarine Feared a Trawler And So Attacked
Germany's Explanation for Preventing Rescues at Sea.
LONDON, April 21.—1:41 a.m.—Replying to the statement of the captain of the trawler Fermo that the German submarine which torpedoed the trawler Vanilla last Sunday prevented him from rescuing the crew of the Vanilla, a wireless dispatch received from Berlin says the Fermo attempted to ram the submarine, which was forced to attack the trawler in self defence.

BRITISH PROTEST FACILITIES GIVEN EITEL
LONDON, April 20.—9:20 p.m.—That the British Government had protested against some of the facilities afforded the German auxiliary cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich at Newport News, was disclosed today in a reply in the House of Commons made by Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign minister, to a question asked by Commander Carleton Bellairs, who recently was returned to Parliament at a by-election.

Sir Edward Grey said that before her internment, the Eitel Friedrich had "had her bottom cleaned and coated with a non-fouling composition while in drydock in Newport News, thus considerably increasing her speed."

The United States Government considered that any damage sustained by the action of the sea and not inflicted by an enemy, might be made good. They also called attention to the Hague provision that the local authorities of neutral powers shall decide what repairs are necessary.

Airship Attacks
Swedish Steamer
Off Lowestoft

Bombs Drop Near By, But No Damage Is Sustained.

(STOCKHOLM, April 20.—Via London, April 21, 2:59 a.m.—The Swedish steamer Uranus, which arrived today at Hamstad, reports having been attacked by an airship Friday night off Lowestoft, on the east coast of England. The steamer reports that bombs dropped by the airship exploded only a few yards from the vessel, but that the Uranus suffered no damage.

KAISER DEMANDS
BIGGER ZEPPELINS

Displeased At Meagre Results of Raids On British Coast.

(Canadian Press.)
GENEVA (via Paris), April 21.—1:55 a.m.—German and Swiss newspapers, published in towns around Lake Constance where the Zeppelin works are situated, say that Emperor William seems displeased at the results obtained by Zeppelin airships in recent raids, and has ordered much larger dirigibles constructed. Two of the new aircraft, the newspapers assert, are to be finished each month. Formerly, one airship was built every three weeks. The number of workmen at the Zeppelin plant has been nearly doubled, and the machinery has been greatly augmented. Count Zeppelin has arrived at Friedrichshafen to supervise the execution of the new order, the object of which according to the newspapers, is organized raids against Paris and London.

The new Zeppelins will cost over \$600,000 each, while the bombs they will carry will be double the size of those now in use.

AUSTRIAN OFFICERS MUST GIVE UP SWORDS

LONDON, April 21.—2:50 a.m.—According to the Morning Post's Petrograd correspondent, Grand Duke Nicholas has issued orders that Austrian officers who are prisoners of war shall no longer be permitted to retain their swords. This penalty is to be enacted, the correspondent says, because of the alleged torture inflicted upon Russian prisoners who refused to reveal information to Austrian troops.
