DESERTER GETS SIX MONTHS; ANOTHER CASE ADJOURNED

Records Militate Against Man Who Pleads He Lacked Medical Attention.

Edward Lampham of Sarnia and John Lee of Cambridge, both former members of the 14th Battalion, appeared in police court this morning charged with desertion.

Lampham pleaded guilty and was sentenced to six months in the county jail. Lee pleaded not guilty, claiming he had been discharged because of physical disability, and his case was adjourned until Friday, November 24, to permit him to submit evidence.

Sergeant Major Woodrow represented the battalion and produced the conduct sheets of both men and the military court of inquiry findings. The decision of the military court was to the effect that both had been absent beyond a period of 21 days, which, Sergeant Woodrow explained, permitted the men to be proceeded against in a civil court on a charge of desertion.

Says Attention Lacking. Lampham, when asked by Henry Macdonell, J. P., who, in company with J. J. Dyer, presided at the police court, why he had deserted, stated that he could not get medical attention at Camp Borden.

Sergeant Woodrow denied this, and stated that such was not the case, as several doctors were at call in the brigade to which the 14th was attached.

The conduct sheet of Lampham showed that he had been sentenced on three different occasions by the military court for absence without leave, and on several occasions had been returned to the battalion under escort.

The counts against Lampham were entered on June 17, absent 72 hours; June 27, 7 days 12½ hours; and August 4, 17 days.

"I would urge that your worship impose a severe penalty to act as a deterrent, as the effect of men staying away from their battalions is detrimental to discipline," said Sergeant Major Woodrow.

Pleads Not Guilty. John Lee pleaded not guilty, and stated that he was discharged on June 29 because of a weak ankle and a dislocated leg.

The finding of the military court was read in court, showing he had been absent from July 4 to August 9.

Lee strenuously denied that he had deserted but maintained that he had been discharged, and an opportunity was given him to produce the necessary proof by Friday.

FAILURE TO OBTAIN HEARING AT COUNCIL ANNOYS DELEGATES

T. and L. Council Men Are Criticizing Mayor.

PROMISED CHANCE LATER

Mayor Says He Will Bring Up Plebiscite, But It Is Difficult.

The trades and labor council representatives are wroth today because they were not allowed to address the council on the plebiscite to be submitted to the people as to whether they favor municipal coal yards and bakeries. There is a strong feeling against Mayor Stevenson on the question.

Joseph Dean, R. H. Hessel, J. Terry and others were authorized to speak to the council in favor of a plebiscite. They came as early as they could, but when they arrived the question had been dealt with, and the council had decided against a plebiscite.

After the council there were some warm words, Joseph Dean criticizing the mayor for his failure to have the matter deferred until they arrived.

Another Hearing. "He knew we were going to address the council, and the thing should have been laid over until we had a chance," said Mr. Dean. "We had over 300 names on the petition, of real voters, and these men should be considered. We were not there to discuss a municipal paving plant, because we don't know anything about that, but we do know something about the other questions."

He took the matter up at the next council meeting. We were real hot, and we did not think we got a square deal."

Difficult Matter. However, Mayor Stevenson will have some difficulty in bringing the matter to the council again. As the motion has been dealt with, it will require a two-thirds vote to reconsider the question. This is considered impossible.

The failure to be heard in all probability has killed any chance of a plebiscite. This is what makes the delegates sore.

More will be heard of it, as the trades council will discuss the action of Mayor Stevenson at the next session, and some lively debates will follow.

CAN GET NO NEWS OF WOUNDED SOLDIER SON

Mrs. James Simply Notified He Was Hurt, Without Any Details.

Although it is now eight weeks since Mrs. James, 539 Simcoe street, was officially notified that her son, Pte. Elmer O. James, had been wounded and admitted to hospital, she has been unable to get any details of his wounds or the location of the hospital in which he lies, from the authorities.

Prior to being hurt, the boy had always corresponded regularly with her, but she has had no word from him since he went to the hospital, and is greatly worried. The local Red Cross is sending England for news of the soldier, who was a popular member of Egerton Street Baptist Church.

RAILWAY BROTHERHOOD MAY JOIN FEDERATION

Chiefs of Trainmen to Attend Convention at Baltimore.

[Canadian Press.] Washington, Nov. 21.—Chiefs of the four railroad employees' brotherhoods, after conferring here yesterday with President Wilson, officials of the department of justice, and their own legislative advisers, went to Baltimore today to appear before the American Federation of Labor meeting there and develop an alliance looking to betterment of all organized railway workers' condition.

W. G. Lee, chief of the trainmen's brotherhood, declared the agreement with the federation did not go so far as to provide for a joint campaign to restore the 8-hour law to all railway employees. The affiliation of the organizations was regarded as unprecedented and quite significant, however.

The brotherhoods have taken steps to assist the department of justice in defending the 8-hour law against court attacks instituted by railroad management.

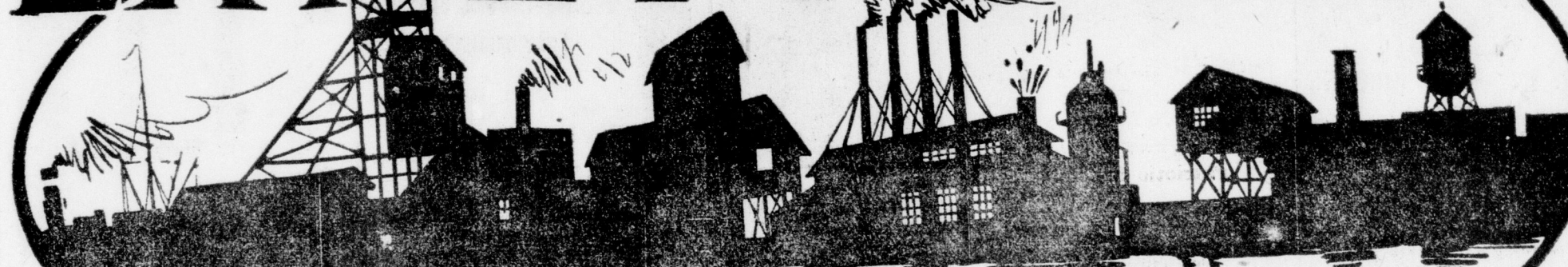
LAMBETH. Nov. 20.—Miss Doreene Brickwood was the guest of Miss Peters for a few days, returning Saturday.

STEAMER OF ENEMY WRECKED IN BALTO
London, Nov. 21.—The German steamer Fritz-Hugo-Stinnes has been wrecked in the Baltic through a boiler explosion, according to a Copenhagen dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company. The vessel was bound from Gofte, Sweden, to Hamburg, and seven of her crew are reported missing. She was a ship of 1,157 tons.

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EXPOSED TO THE GALE ON SIBIRIA'S BRIDGE
Enormous Seas Have Prevented the Rescue of Those Aboard Liner.

[Canadian Press.] London, Nov. 21.—The American steamer Sibilia, with about 40 passengers on board, is lying helpless on the Goodwin Sands, suffering a terrific pounding from an enormous sea. The steamer grounded Monday morning, and so far every attempt by lifeboats from Deal and Ramsgate to rescue the passengers and crew has failed.

It is feared that those on board the Sibilia are in dire distress and danger. They were visible during the day huddled on the bridge and exposed to the full fury of the gale. The ship is so far submerged that they are unable to go below for food, shelter or clothing. It is stated that there are some women among the passengers, but no children.

The lifeboat men have had a rough time in their efforts to save the ship's company. The Deal lifeboat capsized while launching, being swamped by a tremendous sea. Several of the crew were injured, and the boat was compelled to give up its task. The Ramsgate lifeboat was also damaged and two of the crew are reported to have broken limbs. The King's Down lifeboat was successfully launched last evening, and is waiting for a chance to aid in the work of rescue.

CHARGES DEALERS WITH KEEPING PRICE LEVEL UP
MONTREAL, Nov. 20.—The Montreal Daily Star says there are in the neighborhood of 300 cars filled with potatoes blocking the terminals of the various railway sidings in this city, the consignees letting them freeze and paying demurrage charges daily rather than unstack them and place them on the market. The object is to keep up the price, the Star says. The quantity thus held up is said to be about 120,000 bags. Potatoes are selling at from \$2 to \$2.35 per bag here.
