SAYS CHURCHILL TRIED TO INCITE POLAND TO WAR

Lenine Blames Clemenceau's
Agents For Promoting
Trouble.

HOLDS OLIVE BRANCH

Soviet Recognizes Polish In-
dependence—Wants Peace-
ful Settlement.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—A wireless dis-
patch received from Moscow says that
a declaration signed by Premier Lenin,
Foreign Minister Tchitcherine and Min-
ister of War Trotsky addressed to the
Polish Government on behalf of the
council of the peoples' commissaries,
invited a friendly settlement of all dis-
putes and questions outstanding be-
tween Poland and Soviet Russia.

At the beginning, the declaration says
that it is incumbent on the Polish Gov-
ernment to decide whether or not to
make war on Russia. It proceeds to
accuse the agents of Winston Spencer
Churchill, the British war minister, and
M. Clemenceau, the former French
premier, of endeavoring to incite Po-
land to a "senseless, commercial war
against Soviet Russia."

Recognize Independence.
The declaration asserts that the
Soviet Government from the first recog-
nized the independence and sovereignty
of the Polish republic, and that this
will be confirmed at the February meet-
ing of the supreme executive committee
of the Soviet. Further, it declares there
is no territorial, economic or other
question which cannot be solved peace-
fully by negotiation, concessions and
mutual agreements, such as are now
being arranged with Estonia.

securing a firm hold on the world's
championship title, will receive a large
share of the gate receipts.

Doctors Unable To Cope With
Disease—Hospitals Full.

WINDSOR, Jan. 29.—With nine
deaths from influenza in the border
municipalities, Dr. F. Adams, medical
health officer for the border health dis-
trict, Tuesday night called into con-
sultation Dr. J. W. S. McCullough, chief
medical officer of Ontario.

The number of new cases are so
numerous that doctors have been un-
able to report them. It is estimated
that there are 1,500 cases.

influenza and pneumonia patients that
the management Tuesday announced
that no more could be accommodated
at present.

The staffs of the immigration, cus-

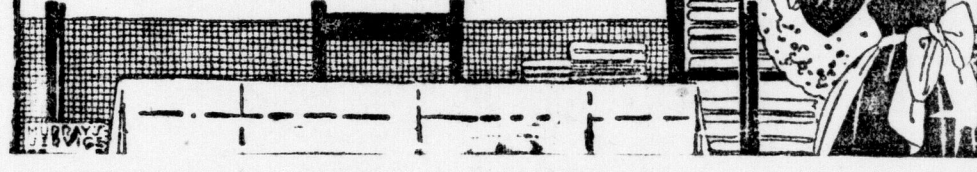
