U. S. SHOWMAN HAS COSTLY EXPERIENCE

Faces Seizure of Show At Simcoe For Customs Tax.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
SIMCOE, Oct. 5.—Acting under
orders Customs Collector Frank
Quinn demanded \$500 customs tax
from the James M. Benson shows
this afternoon, and was paid the
amount in \$1 and \$2 bills.

SIMCOE, Oct. 5.—Failure of James
M. Benson of the Benson shows to pay
\$500 tax as demanded by Customs
Collector Frank Quinn, resulted in
police supervision of the traps, and a
verbal extension of the time limit until
4 o'clock tomorrow. Mr. Benson is not
optimistic of collecting the money with-
in the time limit. The customs collector
stated that if the money is not forth-
coming by 4 o'clock tomorrow he would
seize the whole show.

Later Mr. Benson was advised that
he was liable to pay \$50 for provincial
amusement tax. He got in touch with
Mr. Rogers of the provincial treasury
over the telephone, and in view of Mr.
Benson's financial difficulties, collection
of the amusement tax was deferred
until next Tuesday, when Mr. Benson
promised to go to Toronto personally
on the matter.

Costly Experience.
"I am a believer in advertising," said
Mr. Benson speaking to an Advertiser
writer.
"I have lost more than \$3,000 in
Canada this year, but next year I am
coming back with a heavy advertising
campaign and minus my side shows,
and get it back. I find that I can
move my shows on Canadian trains
cheaper than on my own train, and I
have also learned that there is no tax
on merry-go-rounds, whips, ferris
wheels, "juicy" stands and hot-dog
emporiums. The heavy tax comes on
these side shows and next season I
will leave them in the States. I have
lost \$9,000 in cash, but I have gained
\$100,000 in experience," he concluded.

Donnybrook Fair Biggest In Its Whole 67 Years' History

[Exclusive Staff Special.]
DORCHESTER, Oct. 5.—"They all
come to Donnybrook Fair," and they
all did. Over 7,000 people crowded into
the fair grounds here today and saw
the finest exhibition of cattle and
horses, as well as the most exciting
program of races in all Donnybrook's
67 long years of history.

It was estimated that fully 1,000
autos were lined up on the three blocks
leading to the grounds. Hundreds of
visitors were present from London, as
Dorchester Fair is looked upon as a
mighty yearly offset of the Western
Fair. There were also large numbers
from Ingersoll, Thorndale, Aylmer and
Woodstock, and they all praised the
exhibition highly. The Hussars Band
of London provided the music.

Has Attended 67 Fairs.
An interested visitor was George
Wade, president of Donnybrook from
1904 to 1908. Mr. Wade, who is 85
years of age, has not missed one fair
here since its inception 67 years ago.
He was delighted with the quantity
and quality of exhibits, declaring it
to be the best show he had ever at-
tended.

Booths and midway shops were more
numerous this year, but Provincial Of-
ficer Arthur Palmer of London, who
was present, declared all the games to
be "within the law."

Although there was always a good dis-
play in all lines of exhibits, the fair
is looked upon as a horse show, and
it lived up to its reputation, as there
was keen competition in the carriage
and roadster classes, which both had
heavy entries.

Lady Secretary.
Miss Celia Neely, the only lady in
Ontario who is secretary-treasurer of
a fair association, had made complete
arrangements for everything, and
events were carried off with speed and
smoothness.

Miss Neely, who is a breeder of Dor-
set sheep, swept all the prizes for that
breed, entering the animals in her
brother's name.

Thrilling Races.
Heats in the 250 pace kept the specu-
lators in an uproar, every heat being
so closely contested between "Jus. S."
and "Slip Past" that it was hard for
many people to tell the winner. The
former horse, owned by R. Reardon of
London, won the first two heats, but
"Slip Past" lived up to his name and
slipped past his rival in the last three
heats, being a nose or two ahead in
each trial of speed. Reardon put in
a protest on the last heat, declaring
he was fouled in the stretch, but the
judge, R. A. Skinner of Ingersoll, stated
that he saw nothing wrong. The win-
ner is owned by C. Morris of Rich-
mond.

3-CORNERED FIGHT IN WEST LAMPTON

Liberals Decide To Nominate a Candidate Next Week.

SARNIA, Oct. 5.—West Lambton Lib-
erals fired the opening shot of their
campaign tonight, when, following a
conference with Fred Pardee, M.P., and
other prominent members of the party,
the committee in charge of the ses-
sion announced that a Liberal rally and
convention would be staged here on
October 18, with W. C. Kennedy, M.P.,
as principal speaker.

Asked by a press representative if he
was still in the ring and would accept
the party nomination, Fred Pardee
stated that he was decidedly in the
West Lambton contest, but refused to
say whether this meant he will be in
as a candidate or not.

With the announcement of a Liberal
campaign it means that a three-cornered
fight will be waged in West Lambton
and that the Liberals, Farmers and
Conservatives will fight it out. Speak-
ing of the situation in West Lambton,
Mr. Pardee stated the Liberal organiza-
tion was already hard at work and they
would wage a hard fight in both Sarnia
and the county. Prominent members
of the party are urging Mr. Pardee to
seek re-election and it was stated by
Liberal organizers he will most likely
be their candidate.

PLAN BIGGER FAIR AT INGERSOLL 1922

Many Improvements Are Al- ready Under Consideration.

INGERSOLL, Oct. 5.—The outstand-
ing success of the Ingersoll Fair this
year will doubtless lead to progressive
action for further development next
year. One suggestion offered is that
townships and others in the rural
districts unite in raising a sufficient
sum and proceed with what are
recognized as necessary improvements.
These would consist of increased
stabling for horses, a grandstand and
the widening of the track.

RE-ELECT 4 MEMBERS OF WORLD LEAGUE COUNCIL

GENEVA, Oct. 5.—The four non-
permanent members of the council of
the League of Nations—China, Belgium,
Brazil and Spain—were re-elected to-
day by the assembly on the first bal-
lot.

The vote was: China, 31; Belgium,
31; Brazil, 28; Spain, 37.
Forty-two delegates cast votes.

LABORITE WINS IN LANCASHIRE

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Canadian Press
Cable.)—The by-election in the West
Houghton division of Lancashire
necessitated by the death of Tyeon
Wilson, Laborite, resulted today in the
election of another Laborite, R. J.
Davies, by a majority of 4,000 over the
Coalitionist candidate, James
Tonge.

The vote of Davies totalled 14,876,
and for Tonge 10,857. The last Labor
majority in the riding was 5,152.

Mr. Davies, now a councillor of Man-
chester, worked for ten years in the
coal pits.

A feature of the election was the
high percentage of the electorate vot-
ing, namely, 86 per cent. The elec-
torate number nearly 30,000, of which
12,000 are women.

There are now no other by-elections
pending.

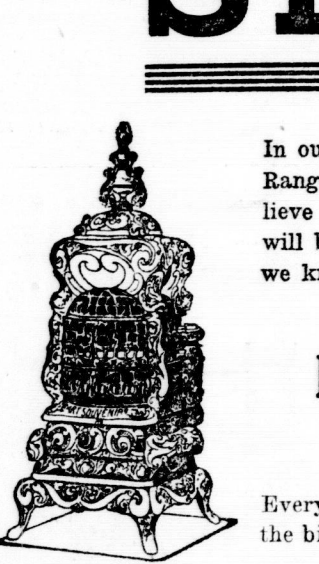

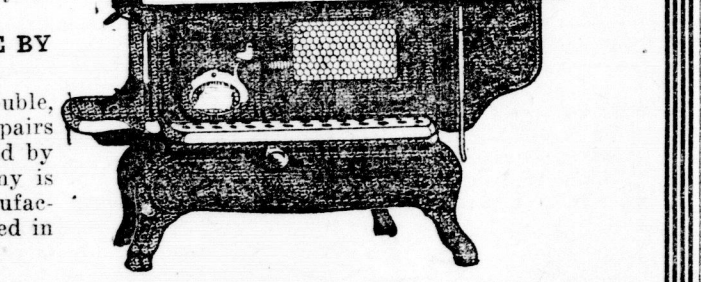
