FOUR HUNDRED GREET PREMIER

Mackenzie King Speaks at
Edmonton at Canadian Club Luncheon.

Edmonton, Oct. 10.—Over four hundred men and women gathered at a luncheon given under the joint auspices of the board of trade and Canadian club today to welcome and hear Premier Mackenzie King. For approximately one hour he spoke on the imperial conference held in 1922, giving to his audience a vivid account of the proceeding, and making a strong plea for trust between the component parts of the empire.
During the morning the premier received a delegation of Ukrainians asking that 1,200 of their countrymen who had been taken to Cuba in error, be admitted to Canada.
The premier spent the afternoon meeting local Liberals and renewing acquaintances with many friends here.

MELLOW BEAUTY PERVADES INTERIOR OF ALL SAINTS

Edifice at Hamilton and Inker-man Street One of Loveli-est in Diocese.

ESTABLISHED 1887

Among the loveliest churches of the diocese! One gives it this distinction readily, after a glimpse at the interior of All Saints' church on the Hamilton road at Inkerman street.

The weathered stone exterior with its dimmed colors of stained glass windows, suggests a mellowed interior beauty, and one is not disappointed.

Memorials of oak and brass, an antique cross, beautiful stained glass windows, and oil paintings in which rich colorings are harmoniously blended, contribute to the whole loveliness of the church.

A brass lectern, the gift of Lady Beck during her life-time, is one of the most graceful of all fixtures. And it contrasts beautifully with the heavy oak pulpit, near which it stands, the gift of T. H. Smallman. T. all cross of antique brass gleams above the communion table, a gift of Bishop Ingram of London, and during service, rubies burn steadily from its extended arms.

Memories Sustained.

Stained-glass windows which flank either side of the church bear the names of those long identified with its service. There are windows to the memory of Jane Bailey, erected by her children, to the memory of George Arthur Gee, erected by his widow and family, to Mary E. Hous Henry Beals by his widow Agnes, to George Talling by his widow, to Alfred Oakley by his widow Sarah, to Pauline Stein by H. G. Stein, to the memory of J. B. Davidson, to the memory of Joseph and Mary E. Hogg by their mother. Other windows are the gift of Leith Oliver Stewart, Harriette May Bason and the rector's Bible class.

Tables which bear imprinted upon them the Ten Commandments and the Lord's Prayer are erected in memory of Eleanor Stein Johnston, William Stein and Charles Smith. And lovely old oil-paintings in the chancel are canvasses worthy of prominence.

All Saints' church has been associated since the year 1850, the old Methodist meeting house was abandoned and services were held in a new chapel built of brick on the corner of Hamilton road and Inkerman streets. This was replaced in 1907 by the present beautiful church, with its seating capacity of 500, dedicated by the present bishop of Huron, Sept. 20, of the same year, with Rev. T. B. Clarke, B.A., as the first incumbent.

Mr. Rice closes his ministry in the parish of All Saints' in the year 1914, when he was succeeded by the present rector, Rev. A. A. Bice, B.A. Mr. Rice left his parish in Durham in 1915, and had previously been for five years the diocesan commissioner, travelling from one parish to another throughout the diocese in the execution of his work. Under his guidance success has followed all efforts of the parish. An instance of this was the erection of a new pipe organ in 1922. When the organ was installed the fund provided for it had been subscribed by members of the parish, and those interested in it.

BETTER MANAGEMENT WEEK NOW PLANNED

Prominent Industries in Canada and United States Take Part.

To stimulate interest in the solution of industrial problems through budgeting for better management, sixty-five important cities of the United States and Canada, have designated the week of Oct. 20-25, as "Better Management Week." These meetings, in which the American society of mechanical engineers, the American management association, the Canadian society of cost accountants, the Taylor society, and the Society of Industrial Engineers are co-operating nationally, are receiving the enthusiastic support of chambers of commerce, Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions and other local organizations.

The topic of budgeting for business control is particularly apt at this time when the general subject of budgeting has been so thoroughly advertised by the efforts of governments to plan their enormous expenditures so as to bring them within their possible maximum receipts, according to Sterling Bunnell, a member of the international committee on management week and well-known consulting engineer.

"The latest and greatest attempt to control through budgeting," says Mr. Bunnell, "is found in the regulation of the expenditures of the German republic provided for under the Dawes reparation plan, with an intent no less than the rehabilitation of all Europe if not of the entire world. It is no wonder that business-men everywhere are asking themselves why the system of planning their operations in advance by a definite schedule should not be found of enormous advantage in private affairs as well as in governmental operations. Profit is the difference between income and expenditure, and is therefore doubly affected by the degree of accuracy with which the accounts of the two sides of the ledger are regulated. By budgeting in advance it should be possible to cut out certain non-essential items, likewise to increase certain items, which, if increased, would provide greater output at a proportionately smaller cost. It should be possible to establish definite standards or percentages of profit and adjust the costs and selling prices to those without reducing the sales return.

"One thing is certain: Budgeting for the better control of business has come to stay."
