A group of St. Thomas young men will join the course next Thursday evening.

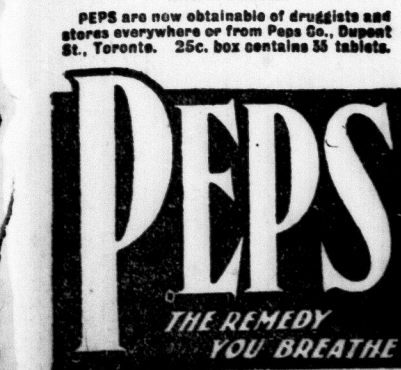

FOOLS ARE FINEST, SAYS DR. GORDON

"Ralph Connor" Addresses Young People's Convention of United Church.

CENTENNIAL CHURCH

Asserts That Young People Are Hope and Energy of the Future Church.

Passion for Christian religion was the theme of an inspiring address given by Rev. Dr. C. W. Gordon (Ralph Connor) before some 150 young people, delegates to the Young People's Inaugural convention of the Middlesex Presbytery of the United Church of Canada, meeting yesterday in Centennial Church.

Young people, said Dr. Gordon, represent at once energy and hope for the church in the future. Mature people lost something of their power of buoyancy which was so necessary to success. That same buoyancy was necessary in religion, which was, at the present time, too long-faced.

The eyes of Christians of the world were turned to Canada at the present time, and eager expectations were in the hearts of all regarding the United Church of Canada. Dr. Gordon also brought out the new sense of pride that was being fostered among the members of the new church, stating that the time was soon coming when Christian folk would not speak apologetically of their beliefs.

Encourages Young People. He encouraged the young people to be out as propagandists for the aged-old faith. He also encouraged them to fight the fringe of persons about their societies. He told them that they must compel the party interested ones to attend their meetings regularly.

"The finest people in the world have been called fools," Dr. Gordon said in closing. "This is the time when the church is bankrupt in making people good. Civilization and democracy have been broken down. Legislation will not change the heart of mankind—it is but a channel through which good men may function. The nations have lost the real sense of brotherhood and goodwill and what the world needs now is young people who will put the church above all else and serve it with a passion that only youth can produce."

Rev. W. E. Millson spoke on the maintenance and extension fund, urging the young people to take an active part in the raising of \$5,000 for the Middlesex Presbytery.

Dr. Smith, a pioneer missionary to North America and to India, who has just completed a world mission tour, appealed to the young folk to relieve the older missionaries on the foreign field.

The afternoon session was presided over by J. A. Guymer, the district president. During the afternoon, interesting conferences were held, at the conclusion of which Max Parr led in a round-table conference.

The evening services of the Young People's Inaugural convention were conducted by Rev. Dr. Hazen. The main features of the evening were addresses by Miss Elizabeth Hiltz, B.A., of the Toronto Y.W.C.A., and J. L. Little, also of Toronto.

Miss Hiltz spoke of the intolerance, narrowness and bigotry which might so easily become a characterization of the United Church of Canada if people were not clear-sighted and clear-thinking. Of how the success of the church depended on unity and co-operation, and the submergence of individual feeling in the great and common tolerance.

She depicted Christianity, not as knowing and liking Christ as a matter of course, but living his life and following his doctrines with love and willingness, born of a knowledge of his great goodness.

"Following the Glean" was the topic of Mr. Little's address. True Christian life was the glean, and he dealt with the different ways in which people were inspired, and the different works to which their inspiration led them. He ended his talk with a stirring appeal to the young people of the church, to lend themselves heart and soul to the work of Christ.

Officers are named. The report of the nominating committee was brought in, naming the following new officers: President, Dr. C. M. Snelgrove; vice-president, Mrs. D. A. Rivers; secretary, Miss M. H. Kelso; treasurer, E. A. Hunt.

The following conveners were named: Christian fellowships, Miss Gladys Harrison; Parkhill, Miss Helen Haedy; citizenship, Lloyd Simpson; Wardville, literary and recreation, Miss Evelyn McLaughlin; London, juniors, Mrs. McLean, London.

"Young people of the London Presbytery," was the name decided on by the convention, and the society was organized to raise the sum of eight thousand dollars for the maintenance and extension fund of the United Church of Canada.

DRUSES BURN TOWNS, KILL CHRISTIAN BABIES

Horrible Atrocities Develop From 600-Year-Old Hatred Between Druses and Maronites—Villagers Are Defenceless Against Marauding Tribes.

Beirut, Syria, Nov. 16.—The 600-year hatred between the Druses and the Maronites had another chance to show the horrible extremes of religious fanaticism when the Druses treacherously occupied Kaoukaba, a locality of 800 souls near Hasbaya.

A band of 500 Druses, led by Sheikh Hamza were seen passing the village in small groups early in the morning. Villagers, led by the Christian sheik, Khalil Khoury Rizk, took positions in the high points of the village. They numbered 40 youths with arms and 80 other able-bodied men.

Soon Sheikh Hamza returned and drove straight to the heart of the village and announced that he was the guest of the village. The Druses sheik told the local sheik that the villagers need not be alarmed, as the Druses wanted nothing from the villagers, explaining that they were headed for one of the few bridges which cross a difficult gorge. He said the villagers should not be frightened if his exuberant men fired a few shots in the air.

Several shots were fired, but not in the air, and they killed a few of the Druses. The Druses sheik had demanded from the villagers rifles and 500 pounds of gold as tribute, besides prisoners. The villagers showed fight, but they were outnumbered and beaten, although even the priests took rifles and fought until they saw it was useless. The village was evacuated.

The whole family of Sheikh Khalil was in the fight, and his uncle was killed. The sheik fled through a narrow passage, and he was met by a band of five Druses who robbed him and even dared to take his clothes off and even burned. The whole town of 100 houses was burned.

The villagers of Abou Kamha had a similar experience. They lost four or five killed. It is thought that the Moslems of Hasbaya joined the Druses in the attack on their hated Maronite village of Kaoukaba. The villagers of other localities fled to the coast, many coming to Sidra, a friendly Moslem town, and it did not conceal its delight at the arrival of the refugees. The Moslems were illuminated and a feast prepared.

AUSTRALIA GOVERNMENT HAS MAJORITY IN SENATE

Associated Press Despatch. Melbourne, Australia, Nov. 16.—The government of Australia, as a result of the election on Saturday, was practically unchanged from that reported today. The senate returned was still inconclusive, but the latest indication was that the government would secure the great majority of the vacant seats in the senate. Victoria, Queensland and Tasmania are likely to return all government candidates to the senate.

Former Premier W. M. Hughes declared that the Labor party had been defeated in the federal election because the people have a deep-rooted belief that the Labor party is in the toils of the Communists. Mr. Hughes, who himself was prominently identified with the Labor party some years ago, says if Leader Charlton had repudiated the charges made in the election campaign that the Labor party was working with the Communists, and had placed the question beyond doubt with the voters, he had no doubt but that the Labor party would have secured a majority of the votes on Saturday.

COMPULSORY VOTE LAW IS EFFECTIVE

Australian Voting Shows 50 Per Cent Increase in Some Polling Divisions.

RETURNS INCOMPLETE

Sydney, N.S.W., Nov. 16.—While still early to describe the full effect of the first test of Australia's new compulsory voting law, an idea of the impetus it has given lax voters may be gained from figures of nine electoral areas, in Melbourne and Sydney, where the counting has reached an advanced stage.

Compared with the last federal election in 1922, the Sydney group of Labor votes increased from 113,000 to 154,000, and non-labor from 75,000 to 140,000. Melbourne Labor increased from 111,000 to 210,000, and non-labor from 67,000 to 171,000.

This shows that there has been a degree of electoral apathy among the non-labor parties. But even these great increases do not suggest after examination of the returns that more than eighty per cent. of the electors have obeyed the law. Therefore, if the twenty per cent. defaulters out of the 3,250,000 enrolled in Australia are mulcted in the prescribed penalty of \$10, the revenue will amount to more than \$5,000,000.

The result of the election firmly established the Bruce-Page coalition of the Nationalists, and the country party with forty-six members to twenty-nine for the Labor opposition in the house of representatives, but because the majority of retiring senators have to be re-elected, it will be necessary for the government to win from 14 to 22 contested seats to secure a bare majority. The early count suggests that this may be accomplished.

The oldest voter in the world, James Wardley, aged 110 on October 29, expressed his hope of voting in the Melbourne electorate. He has voted in 56 elections.

BALDWIN IS SILENT ON TARIFF PLANS

Declares Government Intends To Aid Claims of Industrials For Import Duties.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Nov. 16.—The first day's sitting of the house of commons provided no surprises. Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, announced that he considered the debt arrangement made with M. Caillaux, the former French finance minister, still effective.

Baldwin declared it was the government's intention to introduce a bill to put into effect the recommendations of the various committees which have inquired into the claims of several industries for import duties under the "safeguarding of industries" act, but gave no information on the subject, contenting himself with stating that no action was possible until the findings of the committee were made public.

Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, president of the board of trade, detailed the various inquiries about relating to wrapping and packing paper, brooms and brushes, enamelled hollowware, cutlery and worsted tissues from duties to gloves, glass mantles and aluminum hollowware, on which the committees had already reported. But he added that it was not in the public interest to publish the result of the inquiries, whether favoring or against duties, until the time came to submit legislation to Parliament.

The opposition was prompt in opening its guns on the government. The prime minister had moved a resolution asking that government business have precedence for the remainder of the session.

Ramsay MacDonald, the Labor leader, opposing the resolution, declared that his party was against any extension of the safeguard act, and also demanded from the government the clearing up of its policy in Iraq and Mosul and an explanation relating to the speech of Brig-General J. V. Charteris, who had been quoted as saying that the Germans produced a large number of war-time bodies of soldiers, which later, however, General Charteris denied.

Other members of the opposition backed the government, but Mr. Baldwin's motion was carried under closure, 285 to 121.

FORMER LONDON RESIDENT DIES AT WARREN, MICHIGAN

Henry Nall, who for many years made his home in London, passed away at his late residence, 40405 Helen Avenue, Warren, Mich., on Thursday, Nov. 12, after a very lingering illness.

The late Mr. Nall is survived by William and three sons, Robert and Harry of Detroit and Harry of Portland, Oregon. He is also survived by four daughters, Mrs. Fred Burdick and Mrs. James Murray of Detroit, Mrs. Paul Hawthorne and Mrs. C. C. O'Brien, who reside in London. The funeral took place on Saturday, when six grandsons acting as pallbearers.

STRATFORD STUDENT FIRST.

Watson, a fourth-year student in University College, whose home is in Stratford, has been awarded the Ramsay scholarship in physics, according to announcement by the senate today. This scholarship is the gift of the late William Ramsay of Bowland, Scotland, and is open for competition to all students in the third year in the courses in physics and mathematics and physics.
