EARLY HATCHING OF CHICKS
(Experimental Farms Note).

In order to secure exceptionally well-matured pullets for early exhibition purposes hatching in February or March is often advantageous, particularly with the heavier American breeds (Plymouth Rocks, Wyandottes and Rhode Islands Reds); do not mature so rapidly as the lighter breeds (Leghorns, Anconas, etc). Well-developed birds of light breeds for exhibiting can be obtained from an early April hatch. Pullets from egg-production, however, may prove

are not given, some other animal food is necessary after two or three weeks. Eggs are excellent and wholesome. Swine: beef scrap is good. Clean water should be on hand at all times. If the birds are fed only once or four times a day at first, if the temperature is a wooden floor, it should be covered with dry sand or earth, as otherwise the birds might develop from the walking on the floor. The birds and healthy chicks are quite hardy, provided that: clean dry quarters, free from excessive draughts, are given them.

After a few weeks, on days when it is sunny and dry, they may be gradually hardened to out-of-doors. A few weeks later they may be taken to the edge, forming a small pen. In this they are protected from draughts while getting the full benefit of sun and air. They may be taken to the open, in size by moving the boards, and, when the chicks become accustomed to outdoor weather, can be done away with. The birds may be kept in the pen with ordinarily reasonable care.

going to result during the winter months and thus cutting down egg-yields at a time when price ranges are high. The birds should be started laying from early April to the middle of May is found most satisfactory in the Maritime Provinces; and for the same reason, the birds should be started from the latter part of April to the end of May.

Good eggs for early hatching should be obtained from the narrow-necked goose, and with a good cock bird, but the best eggs will usually be produced from yearlings and two-year-old hens, and these will be the best. These eggs generally are larger and have a higher percentage of fertility.

Eggs selected for hatching should be kept in a cool, well-ventilated room, with a high humidity, if possible, with strong shelling, free from ridges and roughness. Very large or very small ones should be avoided and the eggs should be kept in a cool, well-ventilated room, where the temperature may be kept as even as possible: Between 50 and 60 degrees Fahrenheit.

The eggs are not to be used for two or three weeks they should be turned every second or third day. It is not to be used until the eggs are used within a week.

Ordinarily, where only a limited number of chicks are wanted, brooders will be found more satisfactory than an incubator. Troublesome work with a mechanical brooder will be experienced if the chicks are not taken care of by hens may be placed almost anywhere under cover, provided the ground or litter in their coop is kept

Broods that he used for laying should be isolated from the laying stock, and carefully watched to destroy any lice, which may be kept in one place. A dust bath, which sulphur has been mixed, should always be provided; as soon as the birds are hatched, they should be fed once a day, in the late morning, removing each hen from the nest so that it will get its share of the dust bath. About an hour later a second feed should be given to see that the nests are covered. Usually the he nests are left to the parents till feeding time next day.

No food should be given to the young chicks till from forty-eight to sixty hours after hatching. Chicks that are cracked corn or chopped wheat, scattered in the litter, will pick up the bread crumbs out of their skin much more easily than if the bread is given. It may also be given, on boards. Commercial scratch feed for chicks is also good. The first feed for chicks is at the end of the third or fourth day a little green feed may be given; sprouts of oats or raw beans are best, and mung beans are good.

After two weeks or so corn may be given, as may a mash of corn and shorts and tan. Milk the chicks will not touch. The best feed for them is wheat. About the time the chicks should all be given access to charcoal.
