Mr. A. Loftus Tottenham, M. P. for Leitrim, has been analyzing Mr. Parnell's claim that he and his followers represent the majority of the inhabitants of Ireland. Mr. Tottenham shows that of the 103 Irish members of the house of commons only 39 support Mr. Parnell, representing a population of 1,710,000 and an electorate of 85,458, while the members not supporting the house rule leader number 65, representing a population of 3,702,000 and an electorate of 168,038. Mr. Parnell's percentages are thus 37 of the members, 31 of the population, and only 27 of the electorate.

The customs receipts at this port for March show a further decrease of \$67,000 on the corresponding month of last year.
