MONTANA'S CAPITAL.

How Anacostia's Claims Are Being Presented to the People.

The location of Montana's capital is the question exciting greatest interest in that State. It will be decided at the polls on election day, and the choice of State officers, and a Legislature to elect two United States Senators are matters of secondary moment in the case. So finds a correspondent of The Chicago Record. Helena and Anacostia are the rival claimants to the site. Helena is the old territorial capital, and is said to be one of the finest and wealthiest cities west of the Mississippi. It is also located near the centre of the State. Anacostia is only a rough mining town, but it is owned principally by one rich mining company, and Marcus Daly, an Irishman of 20 years' residence in the United States. Daly is immensely rich, owns all sorts of mines and innumerable other enterprises, and has real estate enough in Anacostia to make the location of the capital there an object worth his expenditure of some money. Hence he is resorting to every method to turn votes for Anacostia, and has his eye on a seat in the United States Senate as another end to be subverted. Votes are being bought right and left, newspapers established to boom Anacostia, and the ground and passages of the people are being appealed to in a variety of ways. One of Daly's master strokes is a handsomely gotten-up pamphlet purporting to originate in Helena, and setting forth that town's claims as a capital site. SALES AT AUCTION.

Suckling's Auction Rooms Crowded With Country Buyers Yesterday.

The attendance at Suckling's & Co.'s auction rooms yesterday was large, with a great many merchants in from the country. The following sales were made: Thorne & Co.'s drygoods, \$11,778, sold to James Shea, Hamilton, at 70 1-2c on the dollar; W. Stanford, drygoods, Ottawa, \$30,000, sold to P. Rochon, Ottawa, at 60c on the dollar; A. McDonald, drygoods, Guelph, \$3400, bought by Mrs. A. McDonald at 38 1-2c on the dollar. A boot and shoe stock in this city, \$22 1-2c, was sold to S. J. Griffin at 41c on the dollar. Backrack of Queen-street, west, purchased the property of the late J. J. Death & Sons at 28 1-2c on the dollar. Several stocks were withdrawn.

The stock, machinery and buildings of the Acme Silver Company will be sold at Suckling's on Nov.

A Singular Judgment.
Editor World: According to Judge Burbridge's interpretation of the customs law in the recent suit by the Toronto Street Railway Company against the Government, imported steel rails are liable for customs duties if not used to promote railway building (gravelly steam), notwithstanding that the Act of Parliament in reference to the matter simply says in counties and parishes of England: "Steel rails for railways, not less than 25 pounds per lineal yard, free." If a number of our citizens organize themselves into a company to construct a railway between Toronto and some other point in Ontario, and to carry out the project import steel rails that are free under the act of our Legislature, and after the rails are laid down in our country, the enterprise falls through and the company put the rails to other use, which that for which they were imported in order to reimburse themselves, can the Government, in the face of the act quoted above, step in and compel said company to pay customs duties? A Landlord and Tenant.
If a man rents a house or store, signing the ordinary form of lease and during his tenancy erects shelving, counters, gas fixtures, etc., which become attached to the premises, Chancellor Boyd decided yesterday that these, at the expiration of the tenant's lease, become the property of the landlord. The decision was given in the case of Argles v. MacKinnon. Previously the law has been that the tenant could remove any fixtures that he might erect. The Chancellor adds that "the matter is deserving of legislative consideration as to whether some consideration should not be put on the general words of these statutory covenants in leases, so as to make removable all such trade or tenants' fixtures as were before annexation separate personal chattels."

A Varicose Graduate Dead.
Buffalo, Oct. 31.—Hugh C. Zella of the law firm of Brown & Zella was found dead in his bed yesterday morning. He suffered from rheumatism of the heart. Mr. Zella was 40 years old and graduated from Toronto University, and had been engaged in this city in the practice of his profession about eight years. He leaves a wife and one son.
