

ASK MURDOCK TO KEEP OUT

Woodstock Molders Object to His Advice

ARE SUPPORTING NESBITT

Don't Relish Being Called Ignorant Outfit

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 30.—Some time ago the molders of the iron, in session, decided to endorse the candidature of E. W. Nesbitt, N. L. C. in North Oxford. Their decision was embodied in a resolution, which, at the request of the union, was published. Since that date it appears that the Liberal candidate took the liberty of forwarding the resolution to Mr. Murdoch, late member of the Chamber of Commerce, who in turn read the molders a lecture through a letter which Dr. Sinclair later published. The action of the doctor and of Mr. Murdoch was the cause of a meeting of the molders last night, at which the indignation of that body was expressed in the following letter:

"On Friday, November 18, the members of Local 243, of the Iron Molders of North America, in session assembled, decided by resolution after due consideration of the issues of the federal election campaign, to support the federal candidate, Mr. Murdoch, in support of the Mighen policy of moderate protection. It was published at our request and duly enrolled in the minutes of our organization."

"Since that date we note by a feature item in Dr. Sinclair's department in The Sentinel-Review that the resolution was forwarded by the doctor to Mr. James Murdoch of Toronto, who in turn writes a letter in which he calls the molders to book as being more or less of a slavish, ignorant and deluded outfit. Anent this letter, we beg leave to point out to the citizens of Woodstock that we do not depend for our living upon the advice of the said James Murdoch nor do we take kindly to his suggestion that he is the mentor of the workman. In other words, as workmen following an honored trade, we reserve the right to mind our own business in this particular matter and would convey to Mr. Murdoch a like suggestion relative to his duties. Moreover, we do not find it incumbent upon us as a body to consult Dr. Sinclair in such matters and would respectfully advise that the doctor allow the molders to follow their own right, which appears to be quite sufficiently bright for the time being, at any rate. As we feel that Mr. Murdoch has taken unwarranted liberty in thus expressing himself on this subject we ask you to kindly publish this letter, in order that our position may be made clear to all concerned."

BURFORD TOWNSHIP BARN IS DESTROYED

PRINCETON, Nov. 30.—Fire of an unknown origin completely destroyed the big barn of George E. Daniels, between concessions two and three of Burford Township early this morning. Crops and implements and pigs and poultry were also destroyed, making Mr. Daniels' loss heavy. The barns were partly insured.

Mr. Daniels was milking when he had the first intimation of the fire. Hearing the roar of flames, he looked up to see the smoke arise and too far advanced to admit any attempt to check the fire. The drive shed adjacent soon caught fire as well, and this was also destroyed. Besides the machinery and vehicles inside, some valuable new harness was burned. Horses and cattle were rescued from the stables, but five pigs and 40 chickens were consumed.

Clerk of the Court Leclair was writing "envoyé" (dismissed) across the record, when MacDonald, who had not understood the conversation, said: "I plead guilty, my lord."

So instead of walking out of the court a free man, MacDonald will get in Bordeaux until his trial, and perchance for some time longer than that.

STRATHROY MAN HELD ON FT. WAYNE CHARGE

John Jennings Arrested on Charge of Wife Desertion—Enthusiastic Hydro Meeting.

STRATHROY, Nov. 30.—John Jennings, who has been residing in this vicinity for some months, was arrested by Chief of Police A. E. Wilson last night, charged with wife desertion, on advice received from the police department of Fort Wayne, Ind. Jennings was married last June, and shortly after returned to Canada, leaving his wife in Fort Wayne. A detective arrived from that city to-day to take Jennings back there for trial.

J. N. Wilson, hydro engineer, and his assistant, Mr. McKenzie, addressed the farmers of this vicinity on the hydro question in the town hall here last evening. A large number of farmers were present, and displayed much enthusiasm over this new project. It is the idea of the commission to extend a line from Strathroy to the village of Kerrwood to serve that village and the farmers en route. Seventeen signed contracts last evening, and it was expected that as many more would sign to-day. The engineers left this morning, going over the proposed route.

SAV PEOPLE OPPRESSED.

SARNIA, Nov. 30.—The Progressive party staged a rally to-night in the Imperial Theater, with an overflow meeting at the city hall, and both meetings were crowded with people curious to hear the farmers' side of the story.

Premier Drury was the great attraction, and the other speakers were R. J. White, Progressive candidate for West Lambton; A. Roberts, of St. Thomas; and Miss McNab, of Hamilton. Both the Conservative party and the Liberals came in for condemnation, and the oppressed people were invited to join the standard of the Progressives, which was to lift the nation from its slough of despond and bring prosperity to the masses of the people long under the heel of the "big interests." The audiences were respectful and attentive.

HORSES SELL FOR \$80.

CARGILL, Nov. 30.—At an auction sale on the farm of Frank Milhausen, in Greenock, yesterday, everything sold at fairly high prices, considering the present condition of the stock market. Cows sold from \$45 to \$61. Some horses brought only \$30, while others sold a little higher. Young pigs sold for \$3 a pair.

FIRE FORCE QUILTS: NEW ONE HIRED

Blenheim Department Would Elect Own Chief

COUNCIL GETS ULTIMATUM

Stands Behind Chief Scoyne, Recently Appointed

BLenheim, Nov. 30.—There was quite a sensation here to-day when it was announced that members of the fire department had presented their resignations in a body. It appears that for some time there has been friction between members of the department and the chief, Sam Scoyne, who was appointed less than a year ago, with full authority over all matters pertaining to the fire-fighting equipment and working.

The firemen had a meeting last night, and this morning sent a letter to Mayor Cumis, stating that they wanted the privilege of electing their own chief and secretary, and asking for the dismissal of Scoyne, stating that unless their demands were met the Council was to consider their resignations as taking effect to-day.

RESIGNATIONS ACCEPTED.

The members of the Council were called together at once, and it was unanimously decided to accept the resignations and to stand by Chief Scoyne.

The dismissal of Day Officer Lowes was also made, as he has been acting in that capacity as well as engineer on the motor truck.

The property committee of the Council in the meantime has engaged E. W. Knight to operate the engine, and has enlisted a full quota of members for a new fire department, on duty now.

TOOK COAL.

Detective T. W. Hare came to town a few days ago, and after an investigation laid complaint against two Belgians and their wives, residing at the brickyard of John Wardell, of stealing coal from the railroad company, picking it up along the tracks. The case came up in police court here to-day before Magistrate Whittington, who imposed

a fine and costs, which, together with the cost of the coal estimated to have been taken, made the total bill against the accused run up to \$16 each.

TEN CHILDREN KILLED

School Bus Struck by Train at Crossing Near Red Bluff, California

RED BLUFF, Calif., Nov. 30.—Ten high school students were killed to-day south of here at the Proberta crossing, when Southern Pacific train No. 15, southbound, struck the high school automobile bus in which they were riding. Four children and the driver were injured.

The bus, en route with children to school, had suffered an accident and was behind schedule. Two drivers were sent from the high school to bring it in. Another bus crossed ahead of the train, but this one, following closely behind it in a dense fog, was struck squarely and hurled into a block signal.

Enclosed in the car, the children were unable to escape and their bodies were hurled in all directions.
