Get two pennyworth of sawdust from a carpenter and one pint of benzine from an oil merchant. Moisten some of the sawdust with the benzine, and rub thoroughly into the fur, a little at a time, shaking out the sawdust as it gets dirty. When the fur looks clean rub with dry sawdust. Hang on a line in the air till the fur looks dry and natural once more, and all the sawdust is gone. Remember that benzine should not be used near a strong fire or artificial light.


