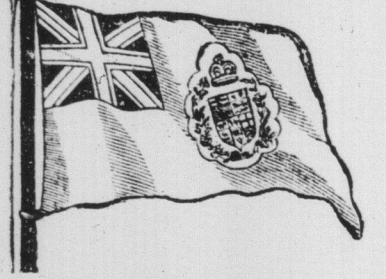

GRAND LODGE, I. O. O. F.

The Meetings Held in Kentville a Big Success.

The 61st annual session of the I. O. O. F. Grand Lodge of the Maritime Provinces of Canada, which is now attached to the Dominion of Newfoundland, was held in Kentville last week.

Wednesday morning the Grand Lodge held its first session, during which the Mayor and Town Council officially welcomed the delegates to the town.

Wednesday afternoon the D. A. R. gave the visitors a free excursion to Canning and Kingsport. Mr. Graham's private car "Nova Scotia" being attached for the use of Grand and Past Grand officers.

Wednesday evening the third degree was conferred on the floors of Grand Lodge by a degree team from Friendship Lodge, Bear River, while the Rebekah Degree was conferred in another hall by a degree staff from Autumn Leaf Lodge, of Bridgetown.

Mr. W. W. Clarke, one of the most popular conductors of the D. A. R., was chairman of the reception committee, and together with the other members of the committee, spared neither time nor expense in providing entertainment, while Mayor Young made everyone feel that they were welcome to all the privileges of the town.

Dr. R. J. Collins, editor of the town, and Sanitorium escorted hundreds of visitors through these beautiful buildings, explaining every detail, while Prof. and Mrs. W. S. Blair, of the Experimental Farm, took a deep personal interest in their guests, among whom were the editor and his wife, besides showing hundreds of visitors throughout the buildings, over the farm, explaining the merits of the crops, and the quality of the crops under the various experiments.

THE NAVY LEAGUE.

Should Receive the Support of Everyone in Bridgetown.

For want of newspaper advertising, which was unavoidable by Bishop & Bishop, the enterprising proprietors of the Frimrose Theatre, the beautiful picture "It Is for England," which was presented Monday evening under the auspices of Mr. Percy Strong, Secty. of the Navy League, did not have the attendance that the entertainment and the very object for which it was held, deserved.

The Dominion Council of the Navy League has contributed \$150,000 for a home in Halifax for the use of officers and sailors of the navy and merchant marine to be built brick and terra cotta, containing all modern improvements, for at least one hundred sailors, with separate apartments for the officers. Among other things it will contain a theatre or amusement room that will accommodate 600 people.

Lord Funes has contributed \$5,000 for the purchase of a site and other expenditures in connection with the new building. The Navy League is also arranging to procure a training ship that will not only assist the sons of wealthy parents but the poor boys as well. It is hoped that 15,000 members can be obtained in Nova Scotia at \$2.00 each, ladies at \$1.00 and children 25c. This organization should receive the hearty support of everyone.
