Stevens was charged with causing the death of Mabel Hallett, her adopted daughter, by cruel treatment, terminated in the acquittal of the prisoner. Although it was not proved that the girl's death was actually caused L P the ireatment she had received at the hands of Mrs. Stevens, it was very clearly proved that she had been harshly and cruelly used.
