FINLAND AT A GLANCE

Finland-Canada Relations:

- Growing business links: two-way trade of \$1.273 billion (2003); **Finland** is the 17th largest foreign direct investor in Canada (\$813 million in 2002).
- Strong people-to-people ties: 114,690 Canadians claim Finnish Heritage (Census 2001), with a large concentration in Thunder Bay, Ontario (12, 825); both countries share a passion for hockey!
- The state visit to Finland by Canada's Governor General Adrienne Clarkson (October 2003).
- Like-minded multilateral partners: UN, OSCE, WTO, OECD; peacekeeping, human rights and building civil society (especially in Russia and the Balkans); Global Partnership Program.
- Shared interests in the North: Arctic Council, University of the Arctic, EU Northern Dimension Program of Action, indigenous ties, parliamentary relations.
- "Best Practices": growing dialogue and cooperation on health, e-government, science and technology, environment, biotechnology, forestry, immigration & integration, innovation policy.

Canada, Finland and the European Union:

- International Security & Effective Multilateralism: Finland is a valued partner in promoting UN reform, Responsibility to Protect, peacekeeping, human rights, building civil society, gender equality issues. Finland's evolving policy of non-alignment favors an "open" ESDP defense core and NATO's Partnership for Peace.
- Global Economic Prosperity: Progress on the TIEA trade talks will help our competitive export-oriented economies and increase professional mobility. Finland is a world leader in forestry and pulp & paper. The EU's Chemicals Agency will be established in Helsinki in the next years (new chemicals registration & controls). Mutual benefits of cooperating on: science & technology, bio-technology, innovation, IT, regulatory regimes, forest technology and the WTO (Doha).
- Justice and Home Affairs: Finland looks to Canada for ideas on immigration and integration and on policing and correctional services.
- Global and Regional Challenges: Finland's unique perspective and role in the Baltic region and with Russia. Finland spearheaded the EU's has a Northern Dimension Policy and Action Plan, where there is scope for closer cooperation with Canada and in the Arctic Council (human development). Finland's environmental stewardship brings scope for increased cooperation, especially on forests, water, Kyoto and sustainable development. Partners on development assistance.
- People-To-People: Our youth are our future. We need to work together to increase two-way youth and academic exchanges and programs. Parliamentary ties can be strengthened, as can our whole-of-government inter-action between our respective government ministries.
