VALOR OF SERVIANS WAS UNDERRATED

Bulgars Learned Lesson at Enormous Cost of Human Life.

LONDON, July 7.—(Can. Press.)—The Belgrade correspondent of The Daily Telegraph says that the losses of both Servians and Bulgarians are heart-breaking. There is reason to believe, however, that the Bulgarians suffered most, because throughout they hurled themselves on the Servian positions in close formation with bayonet, regardless of the sacrifices such primitive methods entailed.

"Thus," adds the correspondent, "throughout the six miles frontier there has been for a whole week a series of desperate night attacks with the bayonet, resulting in great slaughter. It is easy to understand that the Servians proved more than a match for their formidable enemy and it is obvious that the Bulgarians underestimated both the valor and skill of their opponents."

The correspondent asserts that Ietip has been burned, but not occupied by either side owing to its being surrounded by marshes. He thinks a decisive battle will be fought out near Kustendil and around Krivolak.

GREEKS HAVE LOST TEN THOUSAND MEN

ATHENS, July 7.—(Can. Press.)—The Greek casualties since the beginning of fighting against the Bulgarians total 10,000 killed and wounded, according to official reports.

After the battle for the possession of Kilkish, the right wing of the Greek army forced the Bulgarians to retire across the River Struma. The Greek left wing, after severe fighting, occupied the heights to the south of Lake Duran, and then pursued the retreating Bulgarians toward Strumitza, capturing twelve field guns and inflicting severe losses on the Bulgarians.

Three Years' Military Service

PARIS, July 7.—(Can. Press.)—The chamber of deputies adopted tonight the clause in the army bill embodying the principle of three years' military service. The vote was 339 to 223. It now appears certain that the government will secure the passage of the entire bill without difficulty.

SACKVILLE'S WILL NOTABLE BATTLE

Judge's Charge Was Strongly Against Plaintiffs, and Jury's Deliberations Were Brief.

LONDON, July 7.—(Can. Press.)—The great estate which the late Sir John Murray Scott, the eccentric millionaire and art connoisseur, inherited from Lady Richard Wallace, will be disposed of in accordance with the terms of his will, made in 1901, and of the five codicils giving more than half of his property to Lord and Lady Sackville, who succeeded the Sackville-Wests as tenants of the famous country seat, Knole Park, Sevenoaks, Kent.

The jury of the probate court, where the suit has been in progress for eight days, pronounced a verdict today upholding the will. After only ten minutes' consideration they decided that Lady Sackville was guilty of the charges of fraud and undue influence brought against her by members of the Scott family, and cast the burden of the suit, which will be extremely heavy, owing to the array of eminent counsel engaged, upon the late baronet's relatives, who contested the will.

Received Congratulations. Lord and Lady Sackville will obtain about \$2,500,000 of the \$5,000,000 of the testator's property, including some of his magnificent art collections.

Many of their friends among the aristocratic audience assembled in the court offered their congratulations to Lord Sackville and his daughter, "the kiddie." Lady Sackville was not present today, as she was waiting for the severe strain of the cross-examination she underwent last week.

The verdict of the jury seemed to be a foregone conclusion after Sir Samuel Thomas Evans, the presiding judge, had delivered his charge to them before they retired. He expressed strongly the opinion that Lady Sackville was guilty of fraud, and said that Sir John Murray Scott apparently had felt he had found a custodian for the art treasures which he desired the Sackvilles to keep at Knole Park, and realized that he must leave money to enable them to be kept. For undue influence, he said, there must be something like coercion, and that there must be something like misrepresentation to the testator of facts which did not assist.

With the return of the jury into court and its pronouncement of a verdict exonerating Lady Sackville from any charge of fraud or undue influence, the "dramatic" trial, which had held the interest of the public for over a week, owing to the prominence of the parties concerned, and the amount involved, came to an end.

SERVIANS VICTORS AND BULGARS ALSO

It Depends on Whether News is From Sofia or Belgrade.

VIENNA, July 7.—(Can. Press.)—Despatches received at Vienna tonight from Belgrade show how impossible it is to gather any idea of the real situation from the official statements disseminated from Belgrade and Sofia.

One despatch, direct from Belgrade, announces fresh victories for the Servian troops, who are said to have captured the Bulgarian position at Kikiti, on Osgivka Plain as well as Rujan Heights. It is also asserted that the way to Kustendil now lies open to the Serbs, and that the Bulgarians on Sunday tried to cross the frontier near Obrenovac, north of Kikiti, but were driven back with heavy losses.

Another message from Belgrade, by way of Semlin, where the correspondents evade the censor, says that private advices regarding the disaster to the Servian Timok division and the critical position of the Morava division have become known. Belgrade and Semlin have caused the deepest depression. It is added that the Morava division has been shattered and that the last levy, comprising soldiers between 60 and 18 years of age, have been summoned to arms. Eight thousand wounded, according to this message, have been brought to Belgrade.
