The following are a few results, substantiated by experiments, which illustrate its remarkable utility:

This Grinder gives perfect satisfaction in the pulverization of Quartz, PHOSPHATES, Zinc, Bone, Brimstone, Chemicals, Oyster-Shells, Horn, South Carolina Clay, Chalk, Cement, Cork, CORN and other Cereals, Coffee, Spices, Leaf Sugar, Mustard and Flax Seed. Also in the Grinding of planing shavings, for packing purposes and horse bedding, the pulverization of Roots, Dye Woods, Tobacco, Rubber, Rope, Old Cloth, and the reduction of Wood to fibres suitable for use in the manufacture of Paper.

II. Its Special Adaptations. For grinding *Plax Seed* it has no rival. A great saving of time and labor is secured by *grinding* instead of *masking* this article. Mustard Seed is also effectively ground to powder.

III. Superior Quality of the Product. The superior quality of the products of this mill is observed in the grinding of Corn and other kinds of Grain.
