INTERNAL ECONOMY COMMISSION.

Sir WILFRID LAURIER (Prime Minister) delivered a message from His Excellency the Governor General.

Mr. SPEAKER.

Mr. SPEAKER read the message, as follows:

GREY.

The Governor General transmits to the House of Commons an approved Minute of Council appointing the Honourable William Stevens Fielding, Minister of Finance; the Honourable Louis Philippe Brodeur, Minister of Marine and Fisheries; the Honourable William Paterson, Minister of Customs, and the Honourable William Pugsley, Minister of Public Works, to act with the Speaker of the House of Commons, as Commissioners for the purposes and under the provisions of the 11th Chapter of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, intituled: 'An Act respecting the House of Commons.'

THE FRANCO-CANADIAN TRADE TREATY.

On the order of the day being called:

Mr. FOSTER. I would like to ask the Minister of Finance, with regard to the French Treaty, to simplify matters, and make it a little easier for the members of the House, and probably people outside of the House, to understand the real bearings of the different schedules, if he could have a statement prepared, showing the different items in the schedules, with the minimum tariff, the intermediate tariff and the preferential tariff set opposite to them; and showing also, with reference to the articles on which we are given favoured terms by France, the gross amount of imports into France during recent years. Otherwise it will be a great deal of trouble for each one to pick out all these matters for himself; indeed, it will be almost impossible.

Mr. FIELDING. The first part of my hon. friend's suggestion I can readily comply with, and perhaps the second part also. Although notice has been given of a motion for to-morrow, it may be considered that that will be dropped, and the motion left till the necessary information can be ob-
