But fome objections being made by the furveyor general of the dutchy concerning the rights of the Prince of Wales, now in his minority, and Lord North remaining perfectly filent, Mr. Burke, at length, though he ftrongly contended against the principle of the objection, confented to withdraw this last motion for the *prefent*, to be renewed upon an early occasion.
