

“ of Cornwall to the crown ; for the suppression of
 “ certain unnecessary offices now belonging thereto,
 “ for the ascertainment and security of tenant and
 “ other rights ; and for the sale of certain rents,
 “ lands, and tenements, within or belonging to the
 “ said dutchy ; and for applying the produce
 “ thereof to the public service.”

But some objections being made by the surveyor general of the dutchy concerning the rights of the Prince of Wales, now in his minority, and Lord North remaining perfectly silent, Mr. Burke, at length, though he strongly contended against the principle of the objection, consented to withdraw this last motion for the *present*, to be renewed upon an early occasion.
