LOCAL Y. M. C. A. HAD BEST YEAR IN HISTORY

Balance Is on Right Side of Ledger—Ettobicoke Farms Sell Well—Farmers Will Meet at Richmond Hill—West Toronto Happenings—Latest Suburban News.

EAST TORONTO, March 24.—(Special.)—The annual statement of the East Toronto Y.M.C.A., which has recently been issued, indicates a most gratifying condition of affairs, and one which must prove very encouraging to all who take an interest in this noble work.

S. K. Brown, the chairman, and C. J. Bell, the energetic secretary, have done a great deal to help on this splendid institution, and these and other local gentlemen, as well as the ladies, the knowledge of work well done must be doubly encouraging.

A few facts regarding the financial and numerical standing of the local Y.M.C.A. will be found interesting. The receipts from all sources during the year, together with the balance on hand on March 1, 1910, were \$267.51. This was made up in part from membership fees \$356, subscriptions, offerings and field day \$188.83, bath room \$30.70, rents, etc., to the sum stated.

The expenditure amounted to \$246.13, leaving a balance in the treasury on March 1, 1911, of \$261.76, from which must be deducted unpaid bills amounting to \$123.52, leaving after all said and done a net balance of \$138.23. W. J. Fawcett is the enthusiastic and efficient treasurer.

The statistical report makes most interesting reading and one which every member and citizen generally will read with interest. The total membership is 138, the total average attendance 75. The total attendance 23,323, baths taken 827, visits by secretaries to sick and injured 72, attendance at committee meetings 77, total attendance at boy scout meetings 301, entertainments 4, attendance 80, social and supper 4, public meetings held in hall 14, total attendance at gospel meetings 375, and total attendance at Bible classes 209.

When the fact of the removal of the G.T.R. shop and the consequent temporary enlargement of the Y. M. C. A. is taken into consideration the fine showing made is creditable alike to the officers and members, and the business men of East Toronto who have always stood ready with a kind word and financial assistance. It looks like as the incoming statistical year would be even more successful than that just past.

The recent action of the board of control in deciding to push on the work of the widening of Danforth avenue is hailed with approval. Long-delayed work will be none the less welcome.
