FREE TRADE BETWEEN CANADA AND BAHAMAS

Sir William Grey Wilson Says Ultimately Whole British West Indies Would Join.

Sir William Grey Wilson, a cousin of E. J. Grey, addressed the Canadian Club Thursday, on the Bahama Islands, of which he has been governor for six years. He discussed the possibility of a commercial and political union with Canada, and stated his belief that should Canada accede to the desire of the Bahamas the whole of the rest of the British West Indies would speedily follow.

Sir William's suggestion was heartily received by the largest audience the Club has had, while such sturdy imperialists sat with President Kethrup, Sweeney, Col. Mason, Senator Jeffrey, D. A. Wilkie, Dr. Hastings, M.H.O., Dr. Sterling, and others.

Speaking of the United States, with all their tropical and semi-tropical possessions, Sir William thought the likelihood of a union to Canada, in vast numbers was a tremendous tribute to the finest climate in the world. They had only had seven hot days in the past season, and the temperature varied from 62 to 77 degrees. The bathing was unrivaled, and the brilliancy of the colors of the marine scenery was such that some artists told him they care not attempt to portray such a beautiful scene.

The Bahamas are three days from New York, or 10 days from London.

Commercial Outlook Good.

Commercially, the Bahamas are important, as having the largest territory in the British West Indies. The main steamship lines of the world intersect the islands. The opening of the Panama Canal will greatly increase the trade thru the islands. The islands require the produce of the north, which is not grown in the West Indies. Nearly 80 per cent. of their American imports are from the United States, and only 2 to 3 per cent. from Canada. Regular steamship communication is of much more importance than speed of communication. The freights of the Atlantic would be a great advantage to us without a rate of regularity in sailing. Smaller intervals of merchandise at more frequent intervals dictates this condition.

"I ask you, gentlemen, why the 80 per cent. now imported from the United States should not be imported from Canada? It is a very simple question. We seek to draw together the outlying portions of the empire, if we do not endeavor to divert the whole of that 80 per cent. from the United States to Canada." (Applause.)

A convention satisfactory to Canada and the West Indies that would yield results had been proposed, but Sir William suggested that there was no immutable stability about a commercial convention. They had seen in recent weeks the effect of such a convention which had been regarded as settled.

No Racial Discord.

The constitution of the Bahamas was based on a suffrage akin to that of Canada. Anyone possessing a house worth \$10 a year had a vote. The blacks were as three to one, and the black men invariably elect a white man to represent them. The islands were an: with the horrors of the southern states, in Canada, said Sir William, but nothing of that kind was to be found in the Bahamas.

"A white woman in the Bahamas, in the most isolated situation, would be as secure, gentlemen, as in this room," said the speaker, and he satiated his justice. Britain could not hold the possessions she does, Sir William testified from his experience in the West of Africa. Black or white were impartially punished in every case.

He did not think it would be an evil if some of the lower whites were shut out from a vote on a basis which would exclude the lower negroes. He regretted that Canadians were inclined to treat the Bahamas question as too small. If they all the West Indies or nothing was the view held by some, but if the Bahamas were admitted to fed-

FOUR YEARS AGO

Reminiscent of October, 1907, the Panic Year.

Just four years ago this week, that is in October, 1907, the New York stock market passed thru the worst throes of the panic which marked financial history that year. The low price on the downward swing were reached on the 25th, which was also marked by the incoming of the big interest rate which hand by supporting the market, and thereby checked a still further demoralization. J. P. Morgan and his associates were credited with putting up \$25,000,000 to aid Wall Street, the Rockefeller increases a further amount, while the United States Government supplied \$10,000,000, this latter being deposited in the big New York City Trust Company of America. It was practically impossible to borrow money at that time, the call loan rate rising to 100 per cent.

WHY GIVE YOUTH A CHANCE?

Editor World: "Give the young men a chance was the slogan of Mr. Pedlar of Oshawa at the South Ontario Conservative convention in the Town of Whitby on Thursday.

It was pointed out that there are at least two hundred young men in the Town of Oshawa who will not vote for the Conservative nominee. If this be true, it indicates that the insurgency is not insignificant. According to Brother Pedlar and other opponents of Mr. Calder, the youthful insurgency is due to the fact that Mr. Calder has been too long the representative of the Conservative party in the South Ontario constituency. For progress, could wish that a better reason for the reluctance of the young men in South Ontario to support Mr. Calder were advanced. Because a man has held public office and exercised a public trust for a long time, should be no reason for having his old-time friends turn upon him.

Scanning the reports of the convention one does not see anything to demonstrate that Mr. Calder has not discharged his trust efficiently, nor that he has in any way shirked public responsibility. If the young men of South Ontario think that Mr. Calder has been too long in office, it is not altogether to their credit that they oppose him only on this ground.

Are there any other reasons why Mr. Calder and other members of the legislature should be opposed except on the grounds of old age and length of service? Do the young men of South Ontario find fault with Mr. Calder in not taking any action in the matter of the Ne Temere decree? If so, one could sympathize with their insurgency; or had Mr. Calder refused to resign his position on the bilingual school question, then the outsider could appreciate the unwillingness of the young men to side with him in his political attitude. Is it too much to expect that the rising generation will take their position in politics on principle, and public policy rather than on disagreement as to length of service of their representatives?

The truth of the matter seems to be that the party system as now organized and run does not make provision for the aut matie and meritorious promotion of the rank and file to the higher positions of trust. In a riding like

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—(Special.)—The Canada Gazette to-morrow will contain notice of the incorporation of the "Polson Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Co., Ltd." of Toronto, with a million dollar capital in thousand-dollar shares. The company is given authority to build wharves, docks, slips, etc., and to furnish and sell electricity for light, heat and power, subject to regulations.

The St. Lawrence Dry Dock and Shipbuilding Co. of Quebec is also incorporated with a capital of a million.

GOT TEN YEARS EACH.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 27.—Judge Metcalfe this afternoon sentenced Frank Jones and Harry Kelley to ten years in Stony Mountain penitentiary on each of two charges of attempted murder and five years on a charge of housebreaking, sentences to run concurrently.

The prisoners, who come from the south of the line, figured in a sensational shooting case last August, when Constable Traynor was wounded.
