## MONTREAL PRODUCE

Montreal. June 7.—The United States Government crop report was issued after the close of the markets, giving the condition of winter wheat on June 1 at 83.8, indicating a yield of 587,000,000 bushels, and the condition of spring wheat on the same date was 95.2, indicating a yield of 344,000,000. The area of all wheat in 1918 is placed at 58,881,000 acres.
