## GERMAN CHANCELLOR BEWAILS PROSPECTS OF PEACE

### Ottawa Commons Debates Resolution Permitting Ontario to Make and Sell Wines

#### Plan of League of Nations As Proposed by Germans

Paris, May 13.—The German plan for a league of nations submitted by the German delegation at Versailles and now in the hands of the peace conference committee on the league of nations to which it was referred, contains 66 articles, together with a supplement setting forth the charter for an international league. The special aims of the league of nations as followed by the Germans are set forth as follows: "A—Prevention of international disputes. "B—Disarmament. "C—Securing freedom of traffic and general economic equality of rights.

#### HOW McCULLOUGH LOST HIS CHANCE

Further information of Frank McCullough's plans to get clear of the police in his escape from the jail have been learned by the police, and in the story the theory that McCullough was of the opinion that he would secure money enough to get away without any trouble is borne out. Little wonder is expressed at the news that McCullough went directly from the jail to the old British Welcome League building, corner of Front street and Spadina avenue, on the night that he escaped. McCullough knew the ins and outs of this building and had used it time and again to store stolen goods in. The basement of the premises resembles a cave, and in portions of the basement large sums of money and stolen silk had been hidden for safe keeping.

#### INTERNATIONALIZE GERMAN COLONIES

Proposal Contained in Fifth Note Sent by Von Rantzaup to Council.

Ottawa, May 13.—Finding that an emergency situation exists, the burden of which should be divided between the Bell Telephone Company and the public, the railway commission has a judgment handed down today grants in part the application of the company for an increase in rates. The commission asked for a 10 per cent. increase in exchange rates, but the commission finds a 10 per cent. increase adequate to meet the situation. The long distance rates as filed were not objected to, and the judgment states that they may be allowed. These rates together with the 10 per cent. increase in exchange rates, will be sufficient to provide the sum of \$1,100,000 required by the company to put it on a sound financial basis. The judgment states that the company since October, 1918, has been earning on its outstanding securities less than four per cent., while there is an admitted need of an expenditure of \$7,000,000 for replacements and new construction. The judgment, which is very voluminous, was written by Commissioner S. J. MacLean, and concurred in by Sir Henry Drayton, chief commissioner; Deputy Chief Commissioner Nantel and Commissioners Goodvee and Boyce. A summary of the judgment emphasizing its principal features has been issued by the commission as follows:

Some men are born clever, some are educated to be clever and some become clever when opportunity knocks at the door or presents itself in the way of making money. The man—for it is now said to be a man—who gave the police the information upon which they made the McCullough arrest undoubtedly comes under one of the above heads of cleverness, but which one is most clearly left to the judgment of time. If he comes under the heading of "opportunity" he displayed a degree of cleverness that has hardly been equaled in covering-up-your-tracks stunts for a decade. The informant displayed an unusual degree of brain power, resource and ingenuity in the ways of police and newspaper reporters quite unusual in an ordinary citizen. But now to the story, and we must hark back to last Thursday morning, the day McCullough was captured in Bathurst street. By the morning post the detective department of the city police received a letter giving them the much wanted man's address. The letter was, however, no ordinary letter—it was extraordinary in many ways. It gave an address for which it was sent and was signed simply "Citizen." In addition to the "tip" to the police, it stated that the writer would later claim the reward offered for McCullough's arrest and would produce as proof of his identity an exact copy of that letter which the police would please address to the writer. A peculiar and little used class of paper, in a tint of ink seldom seen and written with a pen not in fashion today, it traced an address from that letter which would have baffled even Sherlock Holmes himself. The police were, however, satisfied that the information was good and all Toronto knows today promptly acted upon it.
