The Directors have pleasure in pointing out that after paying the customary 10 per cent dividend, they have been able to place to Reserve Fund out of profits, the substantial sum of \$135,000 The year's earnings are in the opinion of the Directors very satisfactory indeed, considering that out of the year's profits the maximum estimated loss (\$90 000) which the Bank has sustained by the embezzlement and forgeries of T. Hilhouse Brown has been provided for been provided for

The Directors beg to report that the progress of the Bank still continues in a marked degree, and that, while they had thought it prudent to open during the year a few new branches in Ontario and Manitoba, in recognition of the rapid development of the country, they have mostly confined them selves to the strengthening and building up of the business at the various points at which offices had already been established. It is proposed however, to ask of the Shareholders at the Annual Meeting, power to increase the Capital of the Bank by \$500,000, in order that the Directors, in case it

become advisable, may be in a position thus to provide for the future growth of the Bank's business. The Directors have noted the growing tendency on the part of Banks and other Corporations to pay dividends quarterly and believing that such a practive may become more or less general, have decided to adopt it, and propose hereafter to declare dividends every three months.
