## **ENORMOUS ACTIVITY IN 1906** IN FINANCE AND COMMERCE

Montreal, Dec. 31.—(Special.)—Quebec Province, embracing as It does the commercial capital of the Dominion, has every reason to be satisfied with the business and financial conditions of 1906. Business on the Montreal Stock Exchange during the year has been only moderate in volume and has not in any way reflected the enormous activity prevailing in all other phases of finance and commerce. While prices of many of the local stocks have easily passed former years, the stock market has benefited but little by the appreciation in values A bank or an industrial corporation is slated for an increase in capital or

in dividends, and there is immediately some activity in the stock, but it is not a speculative activity in the strict sense of the word, and prices soon reach a position that stops any further buying by investors. A few stocks that have an obscure future have been worked with fairly good results, but the market is narrow and individual, and it is almost an impossibility with such material to maintain any pronounced period of

The investment buying during the year has been especially good, and demonstrates that there are ample funds when the project has some

The activity in mining stocks has been a feature of the year, the great Nipissing property leading the speculative element to a point where the average Cobalt stock was coolly purchased at two or three times the par value, and even then making a profit for the small but ambitious speculator in the mining chances.

Industrial stocks have been increasingly healthy all the year round. There is not a single decrease since a year ago. The seeming reduction from eight to seven per cent. in the preferred stock of Dominion Coal was on account of the reorganization of finances, the old preferred being

substituted by a new issue at seven per cent.

There have been not a few initial payments and several very large increases of dividends, the mining and smelting companies showing up very well in that respect.

In the case of those stocks not paying dividends it should be mentioned that there has been at least a substantial development in profits and production. The extraordinary increase in the Granby and Consolidated Mining earnings, the Dominion Iron and Steel, the Soo Corporation, Richelieu Navigation and the McKay companies are exceedingly satisfactory, especially in the case of the two steel companies, that have been laboring under adverse conditions for several years.

The British Columbia Packers' Association also had a good year, and was in a position to make a distribution of profits to the preferred stockholders The Canadian Colored Cotton Company renewed dividends, as did Richelieu and Ontario Navigation, and the Laurentide Paper Co., Ltd. On the whole, Montreal shareholders have been very fortunate during the year that is closing, and if the present industrial activity continue there will be few non-dividend payers on the list of securities by the end

He described Mr. Rockefeller as "the incarnation of oncentrated effort," and declared that from an anthropological point of view he undoubtedly represented the com-ing American. He characterized Mr Rockefeller's great wealth as only in cidental, and said that whatever line of business Mr. Rockefeller had chosen he would have taken first rank.

# Commissioner Angus Investigates

Dealings of Charles McGill With New York Stock Brokers.

MONEY TO MANAGER'S CREDIT

Some of the Witnesses Did Not Know Ontario Bank in

Transactions.

New York, Dec. 31 .- (Special.) -- Commissioner George Angus of Toronto today began his examination here of the brokers who were thought to have had business dealings with Charles McGill, former manager of the now suspended Ontario Bank of Toronto, with a view to arriving at a solution of the mystery as to what became of the \$1,150,000 which McGill is charged with having embezzled from the bank during his

management. The work of Commissioner Angus will be probably extended over the rest of this week, since it seems that a misunderstanding existed among the brokers to be examined, and few of them were prepared with data to meet the questions of Commissioner Angus.

The meetings began in the effice of Governor Charles E. Hughes, and were centinued in the offices of brokers where the constant of the case.
