## MORE USE AS EXCHANGE THAN AS ALLEGED PARK

Would Be an Improvement to the Property, Says Commissioner Chambers.

Park Commissioner Chambers is in full agreement with Property Commissioner Harris as regards the desirability of a small section of the western portion of Stanley Park, being leased to the promoters of the new horse exchange project.

"It's the first time, I think, that I have ever recommended that any portion of city park land should be devoted to other uses, but in this case I am quite convinced that it would be an actual improvement," said Mr. Chambers yesterday.

The area upon which it is proposed to build has never been fancied by the public as a breathing spot, so both officials declare, and there is little that is attractive in the aspect. The lower portion of Stanley Park is flanked by a 22 foot lane, which extends from Queen-street to Wellington-avenue in the rear of a line of farm-shed-like and stalls which are most unsightly. The substantial 400,000 structure of concrete in corrugated metal sheathing, which it is proposed to erect, behind the driving shed, extending back 100 feet from Wellington-avenue, will, both officials declare, make a much more presentable boundary than the present one.

It is pointed out also that less than one-quarter of the acre desired is park land, the remainder being, dedicated to cattle markets.

The petition being circulated is understood to be prompted chiefly by private interests opposed to the horse exchange. Residents in the immediate neighborhood are said, for the most part, to be quite agreeable to the enterprise being carried out, tho some have been induced to sign the petition against it on the representation that the whole of the southern portion of the park was to be taken over.

A petition against the proposed closing of Abel-street was presented on behalf of the Henry Abel estate and the Syndicate of Toronto. It was claimed by the American Abel Co., who wish to close the street, that the contra petition had been obtained by misrepresentation, and it was agreed to allow the whole matter to stand over till Monday.

The Sons of England are seeking to have the exclusive use of the exhibition grounds for several hours, on Dominion Day, while the association's games are in progress. The city solicitor will report whether the city may legally allow a public park to be so used.

## Hamilton Happenings

### SETTLEMENT REACHED IN THE STRONG CASE

Presbyterians May Split Subscription Started—Location of New Isolation Hospital.

HAMILTON, April 30.—(Special).—The temperance people, who have offered to buy out the hotel at Stony Creek, had another session with the commissioners this morning. The commissioners announced that they would not hand out their decision on the subject until next Saturday.

A public meeting of the hotelmen of Hamilton has been called for Saturday evening, at the board of trade. The commissioners will be present and will have a talk with the license-holders. Steps will be taken to stop the illicit sale of liquor. The meeting was called at the request of the hotelmen.

Joseph Egan, a keeper of an Italian boarding house at 168 Princess-street, was fined \$50 this morning by the police magistrate for selling liquor without a license.

Lorne and Charles Crisp were sent up for six months this morning, on charges of interfering with the police and vagrancy.

E. P. Gee, retiring organist of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, was presented with a gold watch and chain.

Harry Plaxton, 240 Maria-street, a fireman, had both legs broken, and Jerry Clayton, a brakeman, was severely injured at the steel plant this morning while trying to block a car on a trestle.
