Peculiar Character of the War Eagle, Le Roi and Centre Star Deposits.

In a recent paper Mr. W. Hamilton Merritt, C.E. spoke of the ore in the Red Mountain group of mines at Rossland.

This group of mines is of peculiar interest. There is an amply verified adage that, "Gold is where you find it,"

and like the famous gold-bearing conglomerates of Africa, the Red Mountain gold veins are without a parallel.

The ore is virtually identical with the nickel ore found at Sudbury in Ontario but which carries only a small amount of gold.

The form in which the two occur, however, is very different. While both occur in very basic rocks, the Sudbury ore being associated with a diorite and the Red Mountain ore with a gabbro rock.

The Red Mountain ore is in well-defined strong fissure veins, often with a banded central streak of calcite. To give an example of the strength of the fissure traversing the Le Roi, Centre Star, etc.

It might be noted that in places the Le Roi mine the ore body has been traced across a width as great as 30 feet, and that the average width of the ore is about 10 feet.
