## ROASTED THEIR LEADER DELEGATES APPLAUDED

Representative of Publishers Ad-  
dressed Convention of Typo-  
graphical Union.

Washington, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—The  
representative of the Publishers' Association, addressed the  
convention of the International Typo-  
graphical Union in accordance with a  
vote passed yesterday. Mr. Driscoll  
sharply criticized President Lynch and  
the Executive Committee, relative to  
the strikes in the State of Washing-  
ton, which he characterized as in-  
excusable, and said: "If arbitration had  
been adhered to according to the obli-  
gation of our agreement, there would  
have been no strike or disturbance of  
our friendly relations."

He said it was a pleasant duty  
to criticize the president and executive  
committee of the union, and added: "But  
as a friend of your organization, as a  
representative of the publishers of our  
association, as a man and a citizen, I  
am obliged to enter my protest against  
these violations of our arbitration con-  
tract."

Mr. Driscoll's remarks were applau-  
ded by the delegates, and the chair an-  
nounced that the speech will be re-  
ferred to the committee on arbitration.  
Samuel Gompers, president of the  
American Federation of Labor, was re-  
corded the privilege of the floor, and  
in his remarks welcomed the organiza-  
tion of employers, as it tended to pro-  
mote conciliation and harmony, yet  
there was an element in these organiza-  
tions that failed to understand the  
unions. He declared that no effort to  
destroy unionism could succeed, and  
said extremists on the side of the em-  
ployers can only be compared with  
Herr Most.

"Parliament and its parasites," he said,  
referring to the record of the C.P.R.,  
Parry of Indianapolis, in criticism of  
unionism, "is the greatest possible tri-  
bute to our movement."

A proposition looking to closer re-  
filiation of all stereotypes and elec-  
trotypes in the United States and  
Canada was referred to the committee  
on laws.

## WRECK ON C.P.R.

Two Men Killed in Collision Near  
Sharbot Lake.

Ottawa, Aug. 13.—Going full speed  
two C.P.R. freight trains crashed to-  
gether in a head-on collision about 2

about six miles from Sharbot Lake.  
The dead are: Engineer Patrick  
Holloran of Smith's Falls; brakeman  
James Forsythe of Havelock.

## Sifton Talked Five Hours In Favor of Railway Bill

Haggart Put Up Able Argument  
in Reply, and Emerson  
Now Has Floor.

Ottawa, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—The  
debate on the Grand Trunk Pacific Rail-  
way scheme to-day was really a bat-  
tle between Hon. Clifford Sifton and  
Hon. John Haggart. Mr. Sifton spoke  
for five hours, exhausting the whole  
of the morning and afternoon sittings  
of the House. It was not a forceful  
speech, nor did it begin to measure  
up with the argument advanced by  
Mr. Fielding and Mr. Charlton. It  
was length without breadth. The Min-  
ister of the Interior went into every  
nook and corner of the contract, de-  
fending a detail here and a detail there.  
Perhaps this was the duty to which  
Mr. Sifton was assigned; at any rate  
he signally failed to show a compre-  
hensive grasp of the question.

John Haggart made an effective  
speech. He covered a wide field of  
argument and mercilessly assailed that  
part of the scheme which provides for  
the paralleling of the L.C.R.

Hon. Mr. Emerson of West More-  
land, the prospective successor of Hon.  
A. G. Blair in the cabinet, was put  
on trial to-night. He had barely  
launched upon his argument when he  
moved the adjournment of the debate.  
He will have the floor when the House  
meets to-morrow morning, and it may  
be safely stated that upon the success  
or failure of his efforts hangs the fate  
of his ambitions to become a cabinet  
Minister.

Hon. Clifford Sifton continued the de-  
bate when the House opened this morn-  
ing. He said that Mr. Barker of Ham-  
ilton had cast doubts upon surveys  
made 35 years ago, as if the physical  
features of New Brunswick could have  
changed in that time. Dealing with the  
attitude of the opposition towards the  
intercolonial, Mr. Sifton said that his  
friends on the other side had been  
successfully dissembling their love for  
Mr. Blair for some time past. The  
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## TWENTY TURKS ESCAPED FURY OF BULGARIANS

Inhabitants of Kenati, Near Monastir,  
Massacred by the  
Insurgents.

Salonica, Aug. 13.—It is reported that  
the Bulgarian insurgents have mas-  
sacred the inhabitants of the large  
Turkish village of Kenati, near Monas-  
tir, only twenty escaped.

The civil and military authorities at  
Salonica wired to Constantinople Aug.  
11, stating that a general insurrection  
was expected for Aug. 14, and dis-  
claiming all responsibility unless they  
were reinforced. Constantinople re-  
plied, ordering the enrollment immedi-  
ately of two thousand exclusively Mus-  
sultanian gendarmes for service in Sa-  
lonica. The insurgent banner was un-  
furled Aug. 10 at Konso, near Gier-  
gwell, showing that the insurrection  
is spreading eastward.

Four thousand troops are bombarding  
Krushevo, which is in the hands of the  
insurgents.

Trustworthy information from Che-  
renia in the district of Florina says  
that the Turks have decided to sur-  
render to the Austrian consul. It is stated  
that the French and Italian consuls  
in Monastir are in danger of their  
lives from Turkish troops. Fighting is  
proceeding at Chernaia, near Gumenje.

## EXPECT TO ARBITRATE VENEZUELAN DISPUTE

Lansdowne Announces That Shang-  
hai Journalists Will Not  
Be Given Up.

London, Aug. 13.—Answering various  
questions on foreign affairs raised by  
Lord Spencer, the Liberal leader, in  
the House of Lords to-day, Foreign  
Secretary Lansdowne said that his  
reason to hope that the difficulties in  
the way of a settlement of the claims  
against Venezuela, by arbitration at  
The Hague, would soon be removed.

Definite instructions, he declared, had  
been given by the British govern-  
ment, that the Chinese journalists at  
Shanghai should not be surrendered to  
Chinese justice.

The government was watching events  
in the Balkans, and would utilize  
every opportunity of mitigating the  
troubles there.

Lord Spencer further called attention  
to the government's agreement with  
the Cunard Steamship Company, which  
was approved by the House of Com-  
mons yesterday, and moved for a  
return of the statistics relating to pre-  
vious subsidies.

Lord Selborne defended the agree-  
ment on naval and economic grounds.  
It kept, he said, at least one of the  
great trans-Atlantic lines under British  
control, and it had not merely a naval,  
but a wider national aspect.

Lord Spencer's motion was "after-  
wards accepted."

## AWAITS ROYAL ASSENT.

London, Aug. 13.—The House of Lords  
to-day agreed to the Irish land bill  
in the form finally approved by the  
House of Commons. The latter house yester-  
day accepted all the amendments made  
by the lords. The measure now only  
awaits the royal assent to become law.
