He said that some years ago the subject of temperance had been placed on the study list, and taught in the schools, but he doubted very much if the children knew anything more about it than before it was introduced. He had no objection to the rudiments of cooking being taught, but he did oppose the teaching of scientific chemistry

to small children. Mrs. Boomer replied that she thought Mr. Baker's remarks were entirely out of order, and intimated that the time allowed for each speaker was more than up.

Mr. Baker said he understood he would have sufficient time to reply, and still further objected to domestic science in the schools.

Mrs. Boomer said Mr. Baker had
the whole audience muddled. She
didn't know what his objections were,

and doubted very much if he did him-Mr. Baker said he would support the introduction of domestic science in the Art School or Collegiate Institute, but the introduction of it into the public
