CANADA IS NOW A
MAN-SIZED NATION,
SAYS N. W. ROWELL

Tells Canadian Clubs Association Clubs Have Big Responsibility.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—Canada having taken her place among the nations of the world, the importance of Canadian clubs in informing and educating the people on international and national affairs was pointed out by Hon. Newton Wesley Rowell at this morning's session of the Association of Canadian Clubs in the Chateau Laurier, when he welcomed and addressed delegates on behalf of the Government.

Mr. Rowell referred to the league of nations, and to the problems which Canada, no less than other nations, faced. Canada was now a man-sized nation, he said, and must in future take a man's part. He also referred to the large alien population and the obstacles it presented in national unity. Canadian citizens themselves were not very familiar with international affairs, and the Canadian Clubs throughout the Dominion could do much valuable work along that line.

The following resolution was passed by the meeting and will be conveyed to his royal highness the Prince of Wales: "The Association of Canadian Clubs assembled at the national capital beg to convey to your royal highness their

CHATHAM ARMORIES

Dramatic Wind-Up To Campaign—Charges Conservative Not Sincere Prohibitionist.

CHATHAM, Oct. 17.—R. L. Brackin, Liberal candidate, concluded his city campaign tonight with a rally unprecedented in the history of West Kent politics. Before 8 o'clock hundreds were turned away from Griffin's Theatre. The armories were secured for an overflow meeting, but even this, the biggest auditorium in the city, could not accommodate the crowd. The candidate received an ovation at both meetings. He dwelt with the issues of the election in fighting speeches. He declared that Milton Shaw, the Harist candidate, was insincere on the temperance question. He charged that the latter's chief supporter, George Seelman, former member, had stated that in Merlin, the Harist candidate's home town, no scrutineer would be appointed who was opposed to liquor. He reminded his hearers that Milton Shaw, the new apostle of temperance, campaigned for G. V. Seelman against the speaker, when he ran for election on the abolition of the bar. A. L. McCraig, M. P., also spoke.
