Eight Months Figures for 1920 \$84,000,000 Compared with \$57,270. 000 in 1919.

TORONTO, Sept. 19.—(By Canadian Press.)—The MacLean Daily Reports, Limited, in their August bulletin just issued, estimates that in Ontario the value of contracts awarded for the month was \$1,809,000 for residences, \$2,612,100 for business structures, \$4,577,300 for industrial buildings, making a total of \$8,398,000, while a total of \$9,378,000 is shown for engineering work, such as bridges, etc.

For the eight months of 1920 the total amount of construction contracts is \$83,925,600, as compared with \$57,-266,400 for the first eight months of 1919.

NEGOTIATED NIAGARA RIVER TWICE SUCCESSFULLY

President of Chambers of Commerce Congress a Noted Swimmer.

TORONTO, Sept. 19.—Lord Des-borough, president of the ninth con-gress of the Chambers of Commerce of the British Empire, is credited with having succeeded in swimming across the Niagara River a short distance be-low Niagara Falls on two occasions, the first of which was in 1884, when he was known as W. H. Grenfell. The second time, four years later, he was caught in a strong eddy, which drew him towards the falls, and his friends who were watching him were very him towards the fails, and his friends who were watchng him were very anxious, until, straining every nerve, he struck out for the middle of the river, and safely reached the shore on the opposite side. Capt. Webb, the noted English swimmer, lost his life trying to swim the Niagara River.
