EX-KAISÉR AND HIS SONS ARE LIKELY TO **GET ANNUITIES**

Settlement Between Prussian State and Hohenzollerns Held Over.

SOCIALISTS WIN

Bismarckian Precedent in the Seizure of Hesse Estates in 1866 Is Cited in Fight.

MERLIN, Dec. 9.—It is believed that the settlement between the Prussian State and the Hohenzollern family will hold over until the elections in February. So much is assured by the radical attack upon the agreement in the Prussian Diet. Whether this means that the Hohenzollerns wiii get less than was originally conceded depends upon the

outcome of the elections.

The Monarchists, who have not hesitated to fight as such in the interests of the abdicated king, expect the defeat of the present coalition and its replacement by a bourgeois ministry. It needed almost a year to bring to a climax this conflict over the Hohenzollern estate.

This week's tumult in parliament, when paper balls were thrown—which one Socialist deputy moved be collected and placed in the Hohenzollern museum—and when for fifteen minutes the Monarchist Kaufman was drowned out by Socialist Jeers was the culmination of a wrangle which began when Dr. Sudekum and Dr. Seine, Socialist ministers, signed a settlement last January. They signed it in the belief that it gave the Hohenzollerns no more than their legal rights as private citizens.

Contract Now Discredited.

Since then the legal authority of the contract has been discredited, as the law by which the property passed to the royal family was carelessly or inaccurately recorded. The dispute showed also the legal distinction between the state and the crown. In a similar issue two of the very men who were upholding the Hohenzollern rights had then signed a memorangum contending for the state. These two are the present legal expert of the Prussian ministry of justice and Dr. Hergt, leader of the Monarchist Conservative party.

A precedent was also found in Bismarck's expropriation of the estates of the Grand Duke of Hesse in 1866. The law professors of that time upheld his view that the state and crown property were inseparable, and the overthrown monarch had no property. The value of the Hohenzollern property in the settlement can only be guessed, but it is generally believed to have a market value of 1,800,250,000 marks. The properties now charged to have been incorrectly transferred from the state to the crown are among the most valuable holdings, and include the university grounds in Berlin, real estate near the Friedrich street station, lots and parks in Potsdam and elsewhere, and about half the paintings in the old museum of Berlin.

The former kaiser already has obtained 52,000,000 marks, paid to him in Holland by the state, and has 40,000,000 coming through the sale of two houses in the Wilhelmstrasse, now the residence of Frament Eibert.

To him has been promised 100,000,000 in return for operas, theatres, museums, etc., which it is intended to repay immediately to the state pending settlement.

The business management of the Hohenzollern property is now in the care of sixteen families accustomed to expensive standards, and even a billion marks settlement would hardly yield a greater sum than the annuities the Socialists are ready to grant.

The interest in the Diet of the bourgeois parties for the abdicated emperor cannot be construed as a desire for his restoration, it is said. "A Hohenzollern has ruled for five centuries," say many deputies who are not hostile to the republic. "They began with little Brandenburg and built the German Empire. No matter what has happened in the last years, the heirs of these rulers must tot live in straits, and must not depend upon wealthy friends. The world must

not live in straits, and must not depend upon wealthy friends. The world must not be able to point to them and say: 'See how the Hohenzollerns are abused by their former subjects,'"

The rights of private property are also a factor, and care is taken that no precedent shat he established in the case of the Hohn wollerns that might later be applied to other multimillionaires.

GERMAN CONTROL OF MOVIES FAILS

State of Mecklenburg-Schwerin Has Disastrous Experience in First Trial.

BERLIN, Dec. 9.—Germany, the land of state enterprise, has learned not to experiment with government ownership of the "movies." The state of Mecklenburg-Schwerin has just finished a lesburg-Schwerin has just finished a lesson which cost over a million and a half marks and which reads very much like a comic cinematograph scenario.

It began by founding the company with state money under the management of the mechanical expert of the state theatre. He engaged a secondrate theatre director from Berlin on a five-year contract at 50,000 marks a year. When the first rehearsals were under way he went on a personal strike for the title of "Regierungsrat" or state councillor. He also is accused of charging a 10 per cent commission on all supplies purchased, and of making all employees smoke cigarettes he sold them at a 30 per cent profit. A photographer was imported at 180,000 marks a year, and nearly every rehearsal was enlivened by a quarrel between him and his wife, who accused him of coquetting with the actresses.

The first film turned out by the state factory was greeted with laughter by the "trade" and could not be sold. So the company was placed under the supervision of the minister of education, a man who confessed he had only recently gone to a "movie" for the first time in his life and had no idea of the industry whatsoever.

The Berlin director was discharged while making the second film and prompedy filed suit for the balance of his contract. Now the ministers asks the state for a million marks to save the enterprise from ruin. The Legislature has ordered a complete investigation and prosecutions.


