BAR OUT STRIKEBREAKERS TRADE COUNCIL'S DEMAND

Annual Banquet of C.M.A. Branch—Important Proceedings of Board of Control.

HAMILTON, March 18.—(Special.)—The Trades and Labor Council endorsed the resolution emanating from the Guelph Council asking the government to pass legislation prohibiting the importation of strikebreakers. The council will hold a demonstration on Labor Day, but has not decided yet whether there is to be a parade or not. In his address at the banquet of the Hamilton branch of the C.M.A. at the Waldorf Hotel this evening, Robert Holman, who presided, said that the time was past when Canada had to go to Washington for tariff concessions. Other speakers were: W. H. Rowley, H. G. M. Murray, J. E. Walsh, R. W. Brewster and J. S. McKim. R. A. King, principal of the Institute College, India, was the speaker at the Canadian Club's luncheon at the Hotel Royal this evening. He defended the British administration of India.

Conservative Club. A large audience greeted W. S. Middlemore, M.P., North Grey, and Arthur S. Goodwin, M.P., Kootenay, etc., this evening in the Conservative Club. T. J. Stewart, M.P., presided and was given an enthusiastic reception. He declared that the fight over the power bill had resulted in a victory for the Conservatives, and that they would not allow it to pass until they were satisfied.

Won't Join Municipal Union. The board of control have refused to join the Union of Canadian Municipalities in order to get the municipal power to force railway and other companies to conform to a general plan adopted by any municipality. The arguments used were that "the move was largely against the Hamilton, Waterloo and Guelph Railway, and that only Toronto was interested. The city officials said that it would not pay the city to put up the annual fee of \$150 to become a member of the union. Controller Cooper, one of the members of the deputation that visited the natural gas field yesterday, reported that there was plenty of gas to be had if the city wanted to install a municipal distributing plant. A deputation was appointed to wait upon the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board Monday to ask permission to borrow \$100,000 for waterworks extension, and \$45,000 for sewers for the new annex. If the governor-general is agreeable, a civic reception will be tendered to him on April 22, when he comes here to attend the banquet of St. George's Society.

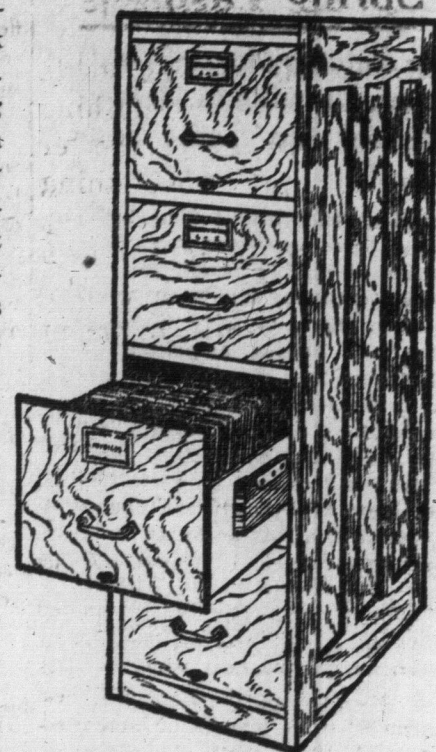
